SENATOR LANE

The Democrat finds itself unable to agree with the position taken by Senator Lane on the question of armed neutrality. Because we disagree with the Senator on this issue we are unwilling to denounce him as a traitor to his party or a Judas to the nation.

If Senator Lane erred in judgment—and we think that he did—it was an error of the head and not of the heart. If Senator Lane took a position which proved a temporary source of embarrassment to the President, he did so because he believed that he was right. If he through the weight of his influence against the armed neutrality proposals which were offered in the Senate, he did so because he sincerely and honestly believed that a change in the form or substance of such proposals might prevent needless sacrifice of human life.

Senator Lane followed the dictations of his own conscience and his own judgment. We think he was wrong, both in his premises and in his conclusion, but we know he is honest. We wish we could say as much of some of his politically prominent Multnomah County critics who are now demanding his recall.

PRESS COMMENT

(Roseburg Review)

Some of the Portland papers are actively urging the recall of Senator Harry Lane. While this might be done, under the Oregon laws, there is still some question as to whether the U. S. Senate would seat a member elected in any other than the regular way. The Senate has full power to determine the qualifications for seating members of that body. Hence it is not very probable that a recall will be invoked at this time.

If it should really be attempted, the matter of a suitable candidate to succeed Lane would at once become prominent. In that case it is probable that some some standpat politician like C. W. Fulton would be brought to the front, although if elected Fulton would be antagonistic to President Wilson on nearly every question brought before Congress. On the other hand, if a man of the ability and breadth of vision of Judge A. S. Bennett, of The Dalles, were chosen and seated, Oregon would be ably represented and the administration would be assured of substantial support. Owing to the many contingencies in the matter, it is not very probable that a recall will be resorted to at the present time, although there may be a strong feeling against Lane for aligning himself with the filibuster against the plans of the President and ninety per cent of both houses of Congress.

While no consideration was given out, the boat is said to be worth between \$3,000 and \$4,000. Mr. Hofer's brother, Lawrence, and Mr. D. M. Fields, also of Salem, are interested in this deal. The schooner will cruise the fishing grounds, as soon as the season opens in charge of Capt. Carner, her former master. The "Gazelle" is one of the staunchest craft on the bay and has been in the fishing industry for several years—Lincoln County Leader.
