Place Names—

The Democrat is in receipt of a book of Oregon place names from Wm. Gladstone Steel, of Medford. The volume is handy and contains much interesting information. In giving the name of Salem, it is noticed that Mr. Steel omits the entire history of the term, as many others do. The original settlement was called Chemeketa, and Indian name meaning peace. This was before the coming of the whites, who afterwards moved the Oregon Institute, now Willamette University, from Mission Bottom to the present site of Salem 9 miles south. The Indian name was hard to pronounce and spell and not so very well sounding, so it was translated into the Hebrew term which means the same thing, Salem. And Salem it has been ever since.

INVENTION OF ALBANY MAN IS BEING TESTED

T. B. Slate Perfects Internal Combustion Gas Motor; Also Aeroplane Propeller.

Washington, Mar. 6.—An internal combustion engine, for which great economies in power and operation are claimed, the invention of T. B. Slate, formerly of Albany Or., is being tested out at the Ford automobile works at Detroit, Mich. Mr. Slate, who spent much of the last summer there, says prospects are bright for its adoption by the Ford interests, particularly for the heavy machines.

Mr. Slate also has a new propeller for aeroplanes which is claimed to possess advantages over other types, and thinks it will be extensively used in the near future.

Tom Slate is a former Albany man and is a brother-in-law of Charles Rorabaugh, of the Fortmiller Furniture Co.

Two years he was working on his internal combustion motor. His plans were disclosed to Portland men, and one evening about 5:00 he heard that they had started for Washington to get patents. He took the mid-night eastern train for the Capital and has been in the east ever since. He arrived in time to cut off his would-be friends, but not without months of litigation.

He has been in Detroit all winter working on his invention at the Ford Motor Co. works. Mr. Rorabaugh received a letter from his sister the other day stating that they were now in Washington and would be there for some time.

The aeroplane propeller mentioned is expected to revolutionize the building of flying machines. By some special blades and better results. The invention was exhibited at the New York Exposition two weeks ago and excited great comment.

While working on the machine in the Ford shops in Detroit last fall Mr. Slate wanted to try it out. He proceeded to build an aeroplane. Before completing the machine he put in a small motorcycle motor and connected it up. He had no wheels on the frame. After loading the frame down with metal he called in another workman to help hold it while he limbered the motor up, not expecting to see more than a shaking of the machine by the small motor.

When the motor started the machine gracefully slid across the room into the opposite wall. The impact threw the drive shaft out of line, and one propeller blade broke, the other hitting Slade a spunk that knocked him into the wall. When he became conscious the room was full of people and the ambulance had been sent for.

Slade crawled away into another room, got a stick for a crutch, went to his room, and with his plans and papers under his arm he started for Washington. After getting his papers entered he went to bed and was several weeks recovering.
