## ALL POSTMASTERS GO UNDER CIVIL SERVICE

Washington, Mar. 7.—Postmaster-General Burleson announced today that after April 1 the appointments of all postmasters of the first, second and third class will be subject to competitive examinations. Nominations will be sent to the Senate as in the past, but in making selections the President will be guided by the results of examinations and will send in the names at the head of the lists.

Whether a Civil Service Commission, under which fourth-class postmasters are now named, will conduct the examinations, has not been determined.

The President's forthcoming order will provide for a form of modified Civil Service classification under which all vacancies, whether caused by resignation, removal or death, will be filled by competitive examination. Those already in the service will continue without examination until the expiration of a four years' term beginning with their last appointment and will then, it is understood, have to undergo the competitive test.

## SPECIAL ELECTION COMING AND NO FUNDS ON HAND

County Judge D. B. McKnight is looking forward to the special road election which occurs in June and is wondering where the money is going to come from. When the legislature passed the \$6,000,000 road bonding act they decided to refer the matter to the people, set the election for June. But those funds are not collected this year. The county has made its appropriation for next year, without taking advantage of the 6 per cent limit. They made no provisions for a special election, and now the court is wondering what to do. Judge McKnight is known to oppose the bond issue and states that he will give his reasons for this at a later date.

The cost of an election will be about \$3,000 and should have been included in the budget and advertised.
