### IN AN ANDEAN CAPITAL

They Have Queer Ideas About Bathing Places in Colombia.  
Ibague, capital of the Colombian province of Tolima, claims 2,300 souls, but the count takes much for granted. It is a square cornered town of almost wholly thatched one story buildings, its wide streets atrociously cobbled and its few sidewalks worn perilously slippery and barely wide enough for two feet at once.  
A stream of crystal clear water gurgles down every street through cobbled gutters, lulling the travel weary to sleep and furnishing a convenient means of washing photographic films. We drank less often, however, after we had strolled up to the end of the mountain and found three none too handsome ladies bathing in the reservoir.  
It is a peaceful, roomy place where every one has unlimited space on the grassy, gentle slope to put up his little chalky, straw roofed cottage, yet all too the street line as if fearful of missing anything that might unexpectedly pass. Foreigners seem to be a great novelty, and I could find no satisfactory reason why so many Ibagueans were blind unless they had overindulged themselves in the national game of starting.—Harry A. ### PROPOSED MERGER OF ENGLISH PAPERS OPPOSED

Many Editors Would Rather Write Than Fight Is Report From London Town.

London, Mar. 2—(by mail)—A shadow fell across the placid path of English journalism today. There is a movement afoot to induce all London newspapers to pool their properties and issue a single sheet, thus releasing the staffs of all but one for active duty at the front.

They're trying it on the dog first. When the staffs of the two local papers in the little village of Petersburg appeared before the military tribunal for their regular semi-annual exemption they were informed that the Mayor had decided the two newspapers should merge into one, and that the half of them could go and get measured for khaki.

The proprietors naturally sat up on their hind legs and howled. But the ears of tribunal are deaf, and the publishers have less than a month to think it over. Mean while, the movement is spreading to London.

### BALKAN NATIVES ON GLOBE BILL TONIGHT

The two Balkans who are headliners on tonight's Hippodrome vaudeville bill, are natives of the Balkan states, one of the warring nations of Europe. They have been in America on the vaudeville stage about five years, and spent 24 years previous to that time appearing before audiences in Europe.

To a Democrat reporter last night they gave an interesting account of their native land (which Ackerman and Harris, their managers in Seattle) forbid them to name during the war, and recited some thrilling tales of their fatherland. Their act is a novelty to American audiences, and comprises vocal and instrumental solos and duets. They play on their native instrument, the tamburitza, made in several sizes. Also on the smallest instrument in the world made from a tortoise shell. "The Letter That Never Reached Home," a song written on an actual occurrence of a dying soldier trusting the delivery of a letter to an American doctor, is sung. They present a musical program consisting of everything from popular to classical music.

### POWER OF A WIFE.

Her Attitude May Make or Break Her Husband's Business.

Charles M. Schwab considers that the attitude of a man's wife has a vast deal to do with his success in business. In "Succeeding With What You Have," the little book he has published, the famous steel master pays the following tribute to Mrs. Schwab:

"I can never express the wonderful help Mrs. Schwab has been to me from the very start. One time a group of men offered me a large sum, \$500,000,000, I believe, for half of Bethlehem. I told my wife about it that evening. 'This is a big sum,' I said. 'Half of what I have is yours. What shall we do? If we sell, your share, invested at 5 per cent, will bring you an income of over \$100,000 a month for the rest of your life.'

"We wouldn't sell for five times that," my wife said. "What would I do with the money? And what would you do without your work?"

"I have seen more men fall in business through the attitude taken by their wives in their younger days than from all the vices put together. A nagging wife or one who is not in sympathy with a man's work, who expects impossible things of him and is incapable of taking a general intelligent interest in his work, is one of the worst handicaps he could have. If a man works with his mind clogged by domestic troubles he is of no use to himself, his employer or the world at large."

### Red Foxes Mate For Life.

Since the days of Aesop's fables tales of foxes and their doings have had their place in literature as well as in the folk lore of the countryside. Many of their amazing wiles to outwit pursuers or to capture their prey give evidence of extraordinary mental powers. Their bill of fare includes many items, such as mice, birds, reptiles, insects, many kinds of fruits and on rare occasions a chicken.

Red foxes apparently pair for life and occupy dens dug by themselves in a secluded knoll or among rocks. These dens, which sometimes are occupied for years in succession, always have two or more entrances opening in opposite directions, so that an enemy entering on one side may be eluded readily. The young, numbering up to eight or nine, are tenderly cared for by both parents.—National Geographic Magazine.
