The general tendency of the markets
today is on the upward trend. Every-
thing from wheat to butter is higher.

Yesterday wheat reached the high-
est mark ever recorded in Portland,
when \$1.75 was reached. Locally the
mills are paying \$1.40. Oats, too,
came up two cents, and shorts and
flour are up.

Butterfat is at the highest point
that was ever known to reach in this
locality at this season of the year. At
this time last year it reached 39 cents,
while today first grade sweet cream is
bringing the farmer 43 cents and sour
cream 41.

The egg and poultry market holds
about steady, with stronger tendency.
Eggs retail today at 27 and bring 24
cents cash to the producer. Young
broilers under two pounds bring 30
cents locally.

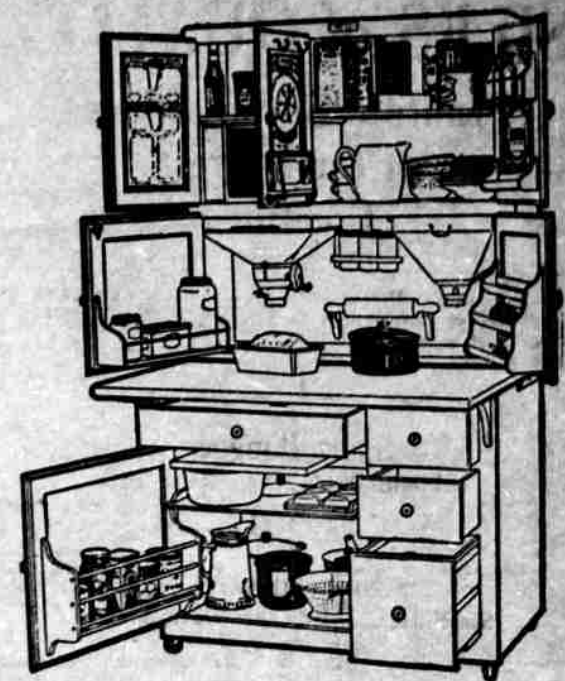
