Hogs Reach New Top

North Portland, April 3.—A good supply of cattle was received on yesterday's market over 1100 head. There was a fairly good demand especially from outside buyers, which put considerable activity into the trading. Quality of the run was exceptionally good, particularly in the steer division, the bulk of the steers selling from 9c up. Prices as a rule were steady on all the good grades of beef steers, while medium kinds sold a little higher in some cases. Cows were in excellent demand and prices were from 15c to 25c higher on the best grades, while others were mostly steady.

One load of prime grain fed steers, the best seen on this market during the winter sold for \$9.90, which was 5c over the previous record top. There was a considerable spread of \$9.60 and

\$9.65 day fed steers from the Princeton country. Medium steers were sold in good supply, with excellent demand, selling from \$9 to \$9.25—Ordinary steers having but little kill to them sold from \$8.15 to \$8.65. One load of prime cows brought \$8 with the top on one bunch at \$8.25. There was another load of dairy cows that brought \$7.50. Medium kinds sold from \$7 to \$7.25; with ordinary dairy breed stuff bringing from \$6 to \$6.50. The previous bull top also lifted 25c established a new record of \$8.25; while the bulk of the prime heavy bulls went from \$6.75 to \$7.25. Thin heavy bulls sold from \$6.25 to \$6.50; while light dairy bulls sold from 5 to 6 cents. A few calves brought \$9.50 to \$10.

The hog market got off on rather a slow start but after trading began, prices were steady to 3c higher and a new top was established on one load of prime heavy hogs from La Grande bringing \$14.55 with a load of Maupin hogs going at \$14.50. The bulk of the sales were made at \$14.35 and \$14.40. Pigs sold from \$12.75 to \$13.25. The supply of hogs was light but quality good and demand excellent.

There were but two cars of short lambs received for yesterday's trade in the sheep house. They were of good quality and were fat, bringing \$11.25 a new record shorn top at these yards.

HIGHWAY COMMISSIONER EXPLAINS NEW BONDING BILL

E. J. Adams Makes Strong Argument For Good Roads Law Passed By Legislature.

State Highway Commissioner E. J. Adams was the speaker at a good roads meeting held yesterday afternoon at the Rolfe Theatre, which was fairly well attended by the farmers and business men of Albany.

Mr. Adams made a strong plea for the proposed new bonding measure and asserted that hard surface roads pay a splendid rate of interest on the investment. The speaker pointed out that agriculturists in the state pay 26 per cent of the taxes, cities and towns pay 41 per cent, timber and lumber 19 per cent and public utilities 14 percent.

Mr. Adams then pointed out that the auto license fund for the year 1918 will amount to \$378,341.12 and taking into consideration the normal increase in the number of cars this summer will annually meet the interest and principal on proposed bonds, leaving a surplus of more than two million dollars. The fourth of a mill tax being left to meet the Bean bill bonds authorized to cover the Federal funds.
