There was a grand meeting yesterday of the comrades of McPherson post No. 5 G.A.R. and the Ladies of Fair Oaks Circle No. 1 G.A.R. at the armory. The occasion being to fity welcome the department of Oregon G.A.R. commander Dr. J. E. Hall of Portland, Oregon. A most enjoyable feast was partaken of a noon, the Rev. C. E. Gibson of the M. E. Church of Albany invoking the divine blessing.

Then following an interesting program the comrades of the local Post presiding. There had been patriotic music galore. Junior vice-commander of the department of Oregon encampment, E. F. Sox gave the address of welcome, responded to by the department commander in patriotic, yet happy vein. Rev. Dr. Gibson gave some inspiring words. Post commander, W. P.
