Washington, April 5.—Indians are setting a rapid pace in stock breeding. Indian commissioner Cato Sells announces to day. Sells is arranging for the purchase of five thousand head of cattle, largely Herefords, 500 milk cows, 500 Hereford and Shorthorn bulls and 500 young mares

out of Indian funds to improve the aborigines' stock farms. More than \$2,000,000 has been spent out of Indian funds in the last three years for stock. Sells said, in every case, the investment was paid.

BOMB GUN INVENTED BY PACIFIST, MOST DEADLY

London, April 5.—A deadly gun that sends up into the air, like a flock of lead pencils, a flight of bombs which sail down on their object with unusual accuracy and terrific explosive effect, has been affording the British army in France a great deal of satisfaction. Officials and men have said it is much the most effective short-range weapon thus far developed. It is known as the Stokes gun, taking its name from Wilfred Stokes, inventor.

Stokes is a kindly looking iron manufacturer, who says that until this war he had never wished to invent a gun that would so much as muss a man's eyebrow.

GERMANS DETAINED BY INSPECTORS AT EL PASO

El Paso, April 6.—Scores of Germans are detained here by department of justice agents in connection with the German plot investigation against the United States in Mexico. It is reported that department officials have information that prominent Carranza officials are involved and arrests are expected. No charges were made against the Germans detained but cross examinations are being conducted.
