

Alexandar, John Cort Attraction at Globe Theatre



The Alexandar attraction at the Globe theatre for one night, Sunday, April the 5th is an attraction quite out of the ordinary in road shows. Billed solid in the John Cort theatres in the North, the management is fortunate in securing the company for one night enroute to fill return engagements in Portland at the Hilleg theatre and in Seattle at the Alhambra theatre.

This show is divided into two parts. The first part being a series of the most puzzling and mysterious feats of magic ever presented upon an American stage.

The second part of the performance is termed the Simla Seance, Alexandar appearing in the role of the White Mathama (syrstatal seer.) This performance is so entirely out of the ordinary that the greatest scientists and most learned men all over the country proclaim Alexandar a brain marvel and the performance an occult phenomenon.

NATIONAL FOREST RANGE TO SUPPORT MORE STOCK

Portland, Or., April 5.—Approved grazing allowances for the National

Forests during the coming season, provide for the pasturing of 8,400,155 sheep, 2,120,145 cattle and horses, and 54,680 swine. These figures, compared with those of last year, represent an approximate increase of 111,000 cattle and horses and a decrease of about 200,000 sheep. Grazing experts of the Forest Service figure that for purposes of range allotment one cow is equal to five sheep. Consequently the increase of 111,000 cattle and horses is held to be equivalent to a net increase of 355,000 sheep, or 71,000 cattle, over the total number of stock grazed last year.

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RECORD TIME MADE IN WIRING WAR DECLARATION

Record time was made yesterday in transmitting the news of the declaration of war from Washington, D.C. to the newspapers of the country. Just two minutes after the signing of the declaration of war by the president the news was received in this city. Manager Royce, local agent for the Western Union and operator for the United Press Association, states that this is the quickest time that any news has ever been sent out from the Capitol to western points.

NEBRASKA EXPECTS BUMP- ER CROPS THIS YEAR

Lincoln, April 5.—Nebraska's crop acreage this year will be the greatest in the states history. Whether Nebraska's 1917 crop yield will be the greatest in its history will depend on weather conditions. The high cost of living for the consequent high prices paid for farm produce, is in part responsible for the increased acreage.

Only a normal wheat crop is expected. Farmers now say that the wheat is not strong and will require the most favorable conditions from now on to make even a normal crop.

The corn acreage will be greater than last year. Where wheat has been winter-killed the farmers will plow it up and plant the fields to corn. The high prices brought by garden produce and by such staples as beans, etc. will mean an increased acreage for these also. Included in this list is very likely to be the potato.

One of the effects of the high cost of living which will be seen in cities and towns over the state will be gardens. In the larger cities and towns every vacant lot stands a good chance of being used for a garden.

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40 MILLION ACRES OF RE- CLAIMED LAND READY

Washington, April 5.—Forty million acres of barren land in the west are awaiting to be converted into prosperous farms, according to the Reclamation Service of the Interior Department today. Soon modern irrigation canals will dot these wastes, supplied by the Reclamation Service from the fund obtained by sale of public lands in semi-arid sections.

Since the service was established 1,500,000 acres of land have been reclaimed and 1,000,000 of those acres are producing crops that will help bring down the high cost of living. Homes have been established on these lands by 30,000 families, and even thriving cities and railroad centers have sprung up where barren wastes existed.

Projects now under way or completed embrace approximately 3,000,000 acres of irrigable land, divided into

60,000 farms. This net investment thus far is about \$100,000,000. In some cases the reclamation even controls its own reservoirs and coal mines for the people who have moved to the opened territory. This instances is illustrated at Williston, North Dakota,

where such a mine has been maintained for five years without the loss of a life. Telephone lines, lighting and heating plants and other public service means are likewise maintained by the government for the benefit of the settlers.



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
