OUR UNDEFENDED COAST

In a recent editorial The Yaquina Bay News very properly calls attention to the importance of Newport as a base of military operations against Western Oregon. The editorial above referred to is in part as follows:

"From a strategic point of view Yaquina Bay is the most vital defenseless port on the Pacific coast line today. Its close proximity to the great wealth and populous Willamette Valley (a short 50 miles from the deep sea) with its rail communication and three diverging wagon roads into the interior make Yaquina Harbor the natural gateway into the very heart of the State. It is surprising that these facts have not been taken cognizance of by the Government long ago. Is it any wonder that several years ago Japanese engineers were alive to its importance when they made a thorough examination of the harbor and entrance. Had the present war been with Japan instead of Germany, and the Japanese attempted an invasion, there is not the slightest doubt but that this port would have been promptly taken possession of and their troops poured into the Willamette Valley."

The editor of the News is right. Yaquina Bay has been sadly neglected but its neglect has been due to no fault of the army and naval officers of the United States Government. It has been due to a lack of public interest in the vital question of preparing the nation against an attack from a foreign foe.

Heretofore we have been content to place the defense of the nation in the hands of the God of chance. We have been slumbering and dreaming along the easy road of pacifism while the other nations of the world have been preparing.

The sleeping giant has now been aroused from his slumbers and from present indications a definite military and naval policy will be adopted. If our war with Germany serves no other good purpose we will be repaid for the loss of blood and money if the end of the hostilities finds our shores adequately defended.
