LEVI HULBERT PASSED AWAY SUNDAY MORNING

Funeral Held Today and Body Taken East For Burial at Old Home Town.

Levi Hulbert, aged 80, passed away at 3 o'clock Sunday morning at the home of his son, J. R. Hulbert, 522 West Seventh street. He had been in poor health for some time, but the past two weeks he failed rapidly and gradually sank until the end yesterday morning.

Mr. Hulbert was born in Durhamville, N. Y., August 20, 1836. He moved to Wisconsin with his parents in 1845. In 1861 he was married to Miss Sarah Rice, who preceded him to the grave in December, 1912.

During the early part of his life Mr. Hulbert was engaged in the contracting business with his father, and followed that occupation for many years. Later he engaged in the milling business, operating a flour mill in his home state. He later took up the lumber business.

In 1909 he came to Oregon and spent most of the time here until his death, living with his son, J. R. Hulbert, and daughter, Mrs. W. G. Ballack.

Mr. Hulbert was a member of the Masonic order for over 57 years and was one of the best versed Masons in the state.

He leaves three children, Mrs. W. G. Ballack and J. R. Hulbert, of this city, and Mrs. Stanley Powles, of Milwaukee, Wis.

Funeral services were held from the home of J. R. Hulbert at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon, Dr. F. H. Geselbracht assisting in the ceremony with the Masons. The body was shipped East on the 3:05 electric, J. R. Hulbert accompanying the remains of his father to Waterford, Wis., the old home place, 30 miles from Milwaukee, where they will be laid to rest.

HE ONLY WANTED A MARRIAGE CERTIFICATE

Bremerton, Wash., April 16.—There's no doubt about the fact that war exists when one sees such warnings as are posted today about the Puget Sound navy yard here. The warning, issued by Captain R. F. Conter, commandant, follows:

"All persons operating vessels, boats, skiffs, etc., other than those belonging to the naval and military forces of the United States are warned to keep out of the waters adjacent to the Navy Yard, and not to approach closer than 500 feet to the line between the ends of Coaling Pier No. 1 and Pier No. 8.

"Vessels or boats disregarding this warning will be fired upon."

NO SUBMARINES IN PACIFIC SAYS JAPAN

San Francisco, April 16.—(By United Press)—Japan does not believe there are submarines in the Pacific, according to a Tokio dispatch quoting the Minister of Marine.

Capt. Gilmer, commanding the 12th naval district, reiterated his previous statement that divers were reported, but that the report is unconfirmed.

SINGLE MEN ARE WANTED TO FIGHT FOR U. S.

Orders Received Here Make It Optional With Married Men to Stay or Leave.

According to instructions received yesterday by Captain R. R. Knox, any member of Fifth Company who has a family dependent upon him for support may secure his release. Captain Knox does not understand this to mean that all married men or men with dependents will be dismissed from the service, but may be dismissed if they so desire it.

Saturday night considerable excitement prevailed about the city when Captain Knox received orders to keep his non-commissioned officers up all night in anticipation of an order to move. Captain Knox and Lieutenants Baker and Collins remained at the armory until 3 o'clock, but the expected orders did not come. Something is expected in a very short time, however.

Washington, April 16.—(By United Press)—William Jennings Bryan personally told the President he was for "anything the Government wants in pushing the war to a quick and successful end."

During his conference with the President, lasting over half an hour, he told the President he is willing to serve on the firing line, or anywhere else the President wants him.
