## WAR ECONOMY

In a personal appeal to the people of the United States President Wilson yesterday advocated the mobilization of every non-combatant citizen—men, women and children—in the work of increasing the food production of the nation.

As pointed out in the President's appeal America must feed her allies, transport the food to the allied countries and at the same time feed her own population. It is a tremendous task—a task which will require the co-operation of every patriotic citizen, but it can and will be accomplished.

Perhaps no section of the White House statement is susceptible of more general application than the one which advocates economy in the home.

The President said:  
"Let me suggest that every man who creates or cultivates a garden helps greatly to solve the problem of the feeding of the nations; and that every housewife who practices strict economy puts herself in the ranks of those who serve the Nation. This is the time for America to correct her unpardonable fault of wastefulness and extravagance. Let every man and every woman assume the duty of careful, provident use and expenditure as a public duty, as a dictate of patriotism which no one can now expect ever to be excused or forgiven for ignoring."

Two days prior to the publication of the President's appeal Mrs. Wilson and Mrs. Marshall set a whole-some example by declining to encourage expensive and elaborate social functions among the members of the "smart set" in Washington. Their example should be followed by every patriotic American woman.

No war can be successfully waged unless it is backed by a united people, willing to sacrifice, willing to work and willing to forego the trivial things of life for the greatest good of the greatest number.
