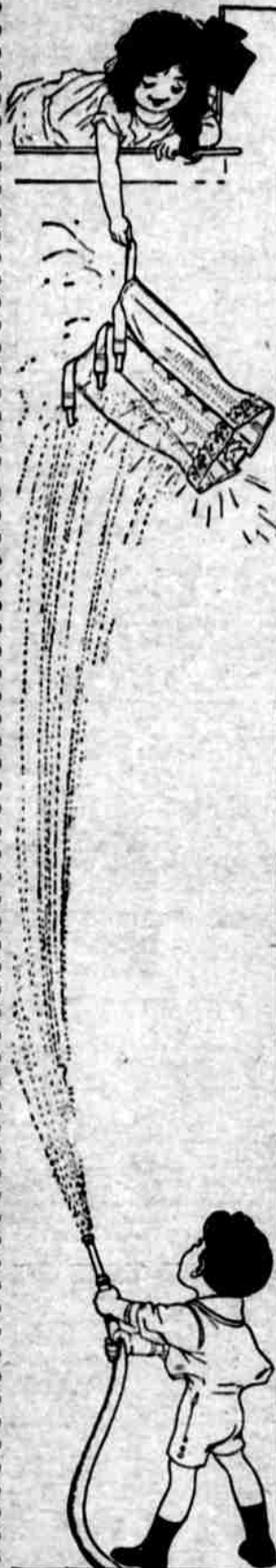

PRIZES AWARDED IN UNIVERSAL KITCHEN CONTEST

Miss Eylla Smith was proclaimed the champion bread baker by the judges in Hamilton's Universal Kitchen efficiency week contest. She received a mark of 96 per cent and was awarded the beautiful nickel plated coffee urn.

A great many recipes for food choppers were submitted. Miss Melba Hoover carried off first honors and received a stag handled carving set for her recipe.

Two of the contestants received 90 per cent on their loaves. Mrs. Clyde Williamson and Mrs. Janie Smith. Two girls from the Domestic Science Class of the high school deserve especial mention. They are Miss Adra Perfect and Miss Henrietta Volstedt.

The three recipes regarded as the best are printed below:

Melba Patties—Two cups of cooked beef, one cup of cooked pork, one-half cup of boiled potatoes, two hard-boiled eggs, one small onion; all chopped fine in a "Universal Food Chopper"; add to this one-half cup of bread crumbs, add salt and pepper to taste, blend well with quarter cup of rich milk and one well-beaten egg. After blending into patties roll in bread crumbs and fry in smoking fat.

Universal Sandwiches—One-half cup chopped dates, one-quarter cup chopped figs, one-quarter cup chopped seeded raisins, one-half cup chopped walnuts, one-quarter cup chopped almonds. Blend well, soften with sweet cream and spread between praham wafers. These ingredients should be run through a Universal Food Chopper.

The judges' third choice was as follows:

Grind in a food-chopper meat left-overs and cold potatoes, adding any vegetable left-overs, salt and pepper to taste. To this add a medium white sauce made separately in a double boiler, with one cup of milk, two table spoons of flour, two tablespoons of butter. Add the yolks of two eggs and fold in whites, beaten stiff. Bake about an hour in a covered casserole, all the flavors being thus retained. I have used the same Universal Food Chopper for years and have proven this recipe to cut down bills and keep the family nourished.

The third item in the contest was the best reason for using a percolator in making coffee. Miss Cassie H. Thompson was awarded the prize. Here's her answer:

"Just as filtered water is clearest and best, so is coffee, when made in a percolator. Coffee if not made in a percolator will COOK, while coffee percolated filters through the grounds and the purity of coffee is obtained in the beverage, and injurious caffeine is retained in the grounds."

EARLY SPRAYING ADVOCATED BY COLLEGE EXPERTS

O. A. C., Corvallis, April 16.—Without the earlier spraying for control of scab on susceptible varieties, a clean crop cannot be harvested, no matter how faithfully the later sprays are applied, and this is the week to make the first application in the Willamette Valley.

The formula for this early spray is either lime-sulfur 1-25 or bordeaux mixture, 4-4-50. Successful growers are very particular that the protective covering is applied to every bud, those in the top of the tree as well as those in the lower branches. An examination will show whether the solution is hitting all the buds or not. It is recommended by the O. A. C. Experiment Station plant pathologist that the second spraying for scab control be applied just as the buds are opening and the blossoms beginning to appear. Still later sprays may be necessary but these two are indispensable to a clean crop where scab is present.

The apple scab spraying will probably be best applied on susceptible varieties sometime during next week. Growers wanting fuller particulars may write to the Agricultural College for a copy of the new bulletin, dealing with apple and pear spraying.
