TACOMA PASTOR PAYS RESPECTS TO KAISER

Tacoma, April 18.—Jesus Christ wouldn't knuckle down to the Kaiser, declares the Rev. C. W. Weyer, of this city. This is what the Rev. Mr. Meyer has to say about Christ's attitude on the present war:

"If Christ was the captain of an American liner and Kaiser Bill said to him: 'Don't you dare sail your boat across this line; if you do, I will kill you,' he would sail the ship across the line in defiance of Kaiser Bill, if it were the right and true thing to do. His disciples warned Him not to go to Jerusalem. They said: He would lose His life if He went. He did not stay and keep the peace. He went to Jerusalem and was crucified, although He knew before He went that He would be. Yet it was His duty to go and He did not shrink it."

CANADIAN RETURNS HOME WITH HERO MEDALS

New Westminster, B. C., April 18.—With a record of distinguished military service in two wars, Private A. Collins has come back home. He is the proud possessor of the Distinguished Service Medal, won in the South African war, and of the Medaille Militaire, presented to him by the French government for his service on the Western front. The price of honor has been high, however, for Private Collins never again will be able to fight under the flag of the dominion. He received a wound in the hip, and shrapnel hit him in the eye.

PERUVIAN GOVERNMENT NIPS REVOLT IN BUD

Lima, Peru, April 18.—Charges that a number of important officers were implicated in a plot for a naval revolt are under investigation by the Peruvian Government today.

The conspiracy is said to have been hatched in retaliation for the arrest of certain naval commanders. The ministry of marine gained an inkling of the situation and promptly dismantled the guns on the warships, besides disabling the vessels' engines by removing essential parts of each which were locked up in the arsenal under heavy guard.

FIVE THOUSAND SCIENTISTS AND OTHERS ARE ENLISTED

Washington, April 18.—Five thousand scientists, engineers and skilled mechanics have been enlisted by the civil service commission for service in the war.

President Wilson has conferred with John A. McIlhenny, president of the commission, relative to the quick mobilization of the country's scientific men. Arrangements have been made to speed up examinations for such applicants. No general relaxation of requirements, however, is said to be contemplated.

MEDICAL MEN OFFER SERVICES TO UNCLE SAM IN MUSTERING TROOPS

Washington, April 18.—Several thousand medical men, mostly life insurance inspectors, have offered their services to President Wilson for emergency work in examining recruits for the army and navy. The offer was made through Mrs. Fula McCleary of the Life Extension Institute of New York.

It is hoped to avoid the delay in mustering in which accompanied the Mexican mobilization, largely due to lack of inspectors.

Attends Meeting—

J. R. Penland has returned from Portland where he attended a called meeting of the newly elected officers of the Oregon Society of Engineers. Mr. Penland was recently elected a director of the state association.

AMERICANS GAIN CONTROL OF COFFEE CROP THRU WAR

Rio de Janeiro, April 18.—The next Brazilian coffee crop is estimated at between 12 and 13 million bags of 132 pounds each. The extraordinary feature about this crop is that about two-thirds of these bags will be bought, sold, shipped or otherwise handled for the first time by American

business interests represented here. War and American enterprise constitute the reasons.

The British blacklist, the shortage of shipping for European ports, lack of financial support and the departure of Germans to their own country to fight opened the door for Americans to take the coffee business from the Germans.
