DEL BLANCETT WOULD FORM COWBOY HORSEMEN REGIMENT

Portland, Ore., April 26.—Del Blancett, well known eastern Oregon cowboy and horseman, a figure in recent Round-Ups at Pendleton, has written Adj. General White of the Oregon National Guard volunteering to raise a squadron or regiment of cavalry from among the cowboys and riders of the country east of the Cascades.

In a letter received yesterday Blancett offers his services in working to make Oregon the first state of the country to have a full regiment of cavalry. Or, if a regiment is not feasible, he expresses confidence in his ability to raise a squadron of four troops in record time.

Del Blancett was one of the favorites at the Albany Round-Up last October, and with his wife, Bertha, made some of the most creditable performances of the show. The Blancetts will probably be back to take part in the Round-Up in July.

Our Poor Record.

The average yield of potatoes in the United States is 113.4 bushels to the acre. In Germany it is 183 bushels. The average yield of wheat here is 15.9 bushels. In Germany it is 32. The yield of oats here is 37.4. In Germany it is 44. The yield of barley is 29.7. In Germany each acre produces thirty-six bushels.

But German fields did not always yield such bountiful crops. Thirty-five years ago Germany raised only 110 bushels of potatoes, nineteen bushels of wheat, twenty-five bushels of oats and twenty-three bushels of barley to the acre. The German soil is poor. The German climate is unfavorable to successful agriculture. Yet by a careful study of the subject of fertilization it has been possible to increase their productivity by 66 per cent.—Philadelphia Ledger.

OBITUARY

A large crowd gathered at the Methodist church of this city Tuesday to pay their last respects to Jasper Darwin Rolfe, who died Sunday evening, at his home near Albany, at the age of 77 years. Rev. C. E. Gibson conducted the services, which were also under the auspices of McPherson Post No. 5, G. A. R. of which the deceased was a member. The pall bearers were Comrades Walker, Sox, Linn, Westbrook, Carmine and Small.

Mr. Rolfe was born at Battle Creek, Michigan, Dec. 17th, 1839, where he spent his boyhood days. He afterwards moved to Minnesota, and on April 8th, 1860, was married to Hulda Matilda Newbury, who died in May, 1873. Five children were born to them: Mrs. Mathew Vicker-man, who died some years ago, and J. E. Rolfe, Mrs. John Carnegie, Mrs. Hattie Stillson of Albany, and Mrs. Wm. Kidder of Youngstown, Alberta, Canada, who survive him. He also had 26 grandchildren and 16 great grandchildren living.

He served in the Civil War, being in Company C, of the 3rd Minnesota Infantry.

He came to Oregon 27 years ago, and for the past 12 years has resided near Albany.
