UNIVERSAL TRAINING

Congress will today decide as to whether or not the United States will play or work at the game of war. It will choose between the selective draft as proposed by President Wilson and the volunteer system which broke and failed in every crisis which the American government has faced since the foundation of the republic.

The eyes of Europe, and particularly the eyes of Germany, are upon Congress today. Are we in earnest? Do we mean to fight a real fight? If we do the answer is conscription. Perhaps no better witness could be called at this time on the issue now before Congress than former Ambassador Gerard. In his speech delivered before the American Newspaper Publishers Association yesterday Mr. Gerard said:

"The German military caste hates the very name America. I know that if we had remained out of this war we would have been attacked by Germany if the war had then ended in either a draw or a German victory."

"Knowing the mind and might of Germany as I have for the past two and a half years, I appeal to the entire country, not only as a patriotic duty, but as an absolutely necessary measure of self preservation, to stand by the president and support the passage of the administration bill for universal military service."

"We are at war with a government possessing the greatest military machine the world has ever seen, and which believes—irrespective of American opinion on the subject—not only that the only effective way to wage modern war is by universal obligatory military service, but that it is to be the only thing regarded as a military service worth the name. To adopt at the outset universal military service would be to deal the blow and demonstrate at the outset that we are in the war to win."

PORTLAND WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REPORT

Making money out of destructive pests and likewise "doing his bit for his country," is possible for every farm owner in the United States. Weeds alone cause the destruction of several million dollars worth of crops every year in the United States. In Oregon, Washington and Idaho, the losses are especially startling, owing to the liberal rainfall in many sections which makes weeds grow faster than the planted crop.
Making the weeds pay is a new one to some, but others who have tried it, find it really no task at all. Not only will the weeds be eliminated to a great extent but also will a long step be taken toward solving the problem of heat shortage. Raise sheep. That's the answer to the problem.
The sheep supply of the world has dwindled at an alarming rate during the past few years. The shortage is more apparent in Europe than in this country, although practically every year recently mutton holdings in the United States have shown a loss.
More livestock on the farms—that's the pressing need of the country today and it is likely to make itself more apparent during the next few years.
In no line of livestock is there any fear of an overproduction for several years to come, at least.
Every farmer should have a few pigs and a few sheep to feed for market aside from his own home requirements. Not only will it be money in his pocket as a result of the keeping of sheep and swine, but in the case of sheep it would be better for the crops, if the sheep were allowed to roam over the summer fallowed land.
