G. A. R. HOLDS A GOOD MEETING SATURDAY

The meeting last Saturday of McPherson Post No. 5, G. A. R., was a
well-attended and profitable one in
part, rejoicing over the improvements
made in the room to the rear of the
hall used for culinary purposes, as
the installation of splendid steel
range, the piping in of water for gen-
eral use, and the dedication of a large
cupboard for dishes, etc. mainly the
work of Comrade F. H. Wheeler, a
splendid carpenter and a fast work-
man, despite his 79 years. Other
comrades assisted and the Ladies of
the G. A. R. provided delicious lunch-
es. The Post took favorable action
to secure a pension for Mr. Louis
Southworth of Corvallis, an Indian

War Veteran, described below. The
principal officers of the Post signed a
petition in his favor, and sent the
same to Hon. W. C. Hawley, M. C.,
Washington, D. C. Louis South-
worth is a colored man, now 88 years
old, and in feeble health, his aged com-
panion, having to make the living. Be-
ing a slave he was not allowed to en-
list in the Rogue River War of 1855,
as the other members of his com-
pany protested against it. Too proud
to ask for a pension in his manhood's
prime, he is now practically a de-
pendent, but owning his own home,
cannot get aid from the country.
The G. A. R. Post and Woman's Re-
lief Corps of Corvallis, have taken
action to Congress in his behalf.
