SENATOR CHAMBERLAIN

By an overwhelming majority the Senate and House of Representatives passed the selective conscription bill. In so doing they showed excellent judgment at a time when it was sadly needed.

Knowing the weakness and shortcomings of the volunteer system, the war department demanded a definite program. It asked that a reasonable method be provided which would permit the United States government to raise a small or a large army with as little friction and as little delay as possible.

That the plan proposed by Secretary Baker was finally adopted was due more to Senator Geo. E. Chamberlain than to any other member of the Senate or House of Representatives.

As chairman of the important committee on military affairs, Senator Chamberlain months ago blazed the trail for conscription. He advocated universal military training at a time when it was unpopular and even politically dangerous.

Oregon ought to be proud of Senator Chamberlain. No member of the Senate from any Pacific coast or Intermountain state stands better, none have wielded the same influence and none have reflected more credit upon the state which they represent at the national capital.

HUNTER TELLS OF LIFE IN U. S. NAVY

U. S. N. Training School, Hospital Corps. San Francisco, Cal., 4-28-17.

Mr. A. C. Schmitt, Albany, Or.

Dear friend: I have been intending to write you for a week or so but have been so busy getting used to the routine here that today is about my first opportunity.

As you have probably heard, the four of us from Albany with thirteen others were transferred to the training school here. We passed through Albany Sunday at noon. We were glad to see so many of our friends there to see us. More would likely have been there had they known we were coming.

So far I like the navy very well. The training school for the hospital corps is up near the top of Goat Island. It is overcrowded now but we are comfortable at that. The officers here are, as a whole, much finer lot of men than one finds in the other branches of the navy. The reserves are in a company by themselves and they are treated as fine as could be asked for.

We will likely be here at the school three more weeks and will then be sent to the navy hospital at Mare Island for three months hospital training. From there we will either go home or—we haven't any idea where. Our work so far has been in drilling with litters, first aid and the different ways of carrying a man off the field.

I haven't been off the island as yet—are not allowed liberty for another two weeks yet—new men must be here three weeks before shore leave is granted.
