PORTLAND WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REPORT

North Portland, Ore., May 1.—Yesterday's cattle market was very active at sharply higher prices. Advances ranged from 25 to 75 cents. Best beef grades made the largest gains there being an advance of fully 50 cents on all prime beef steers. While yesterday's run was only moderate, the quality of the cattle were excellent. The feature of the market was the sale of two loads of yearling steers and heifers, the steers bringing \$11.25, while the heifers brought \$10.65. Four loads of grain fed steers brought \$11.00 with a string from \$10.50 up. Ordinary grades sold from \$9.50 to \$9.85, with a load of good heavy steers at \$10.15. Strictly fat cows brought \$8.50 to \$9.00, with ordinary to good cows from \$7.75 to \$8.25; common dairy cows brought from \$6.00 to \$7.00. Good to prime heifers brought from \$9.00 to \$10.00. Prime heavy bulls brought \$7.75 to \$8.25 with medium light bulls from \$6.50 to \$7.00. Ordinary dairy bulls sold from \$5.50 to \$6.50. Best light veal calves again brought \$10.00 with heavy calves selling from \$7.00 to \$9.00.

Hogs

The receipts of hogs while not being very large, yesterday met with only a small demand which resulted in a good steady market. One load of heavy hogs brought \$15.85 with a couple loads at \$15.75. The bulk of the sales were made from \$15.50 to \$15.65. Pigs sold from \$14.25 to \$14.00.

Sheep

Sheep receipts continue light with little demand and prices are practically unchanged. A small bunch of valley lambs sold at \$13.50 with ewes at \$11.00.
