PEACE TALK

If Germany sues for peace will she keep it for any considerable length of time? This is the question which the statesmen and diplomats of the allied nations are asking each other. It is, in fact, the chief obstacle in the way of an open and frank discussion of peace terms at the present time.

It is rightly argued that a peace treaty signed by an undefeated Germany would be merely a truce. It is claimed that until the Kaiser has been relegated to the private life and a democracy is substituted for the military caste of Germany that peace in Europe is impossible.

The United States could ill afford to consent to a treaty of peace which does not guarantee the peace of Europe and the peace of the world. A truce would be of no advantage. Germany must be defeated and upon the ashes of her defeat must be born a new republic—a government which will make war only in the cause of humanity and decline to draw the sword as a rightful means of advancing the aims and ambitions of a designing monarch.

If American troops are needed in France to accomplish this result, send them. If it requires the sacrifice of American blood and American treasure to free Germany from the rule of a military dictator, we can afford the sacrifice.

We have declared war upon Germany not to advance our own individual interests but to uphold the law of nations and to protect American life upon the high seas. By the law of enlightened self interest we have thus been forced to make common cause with the allies. We are under no obligation to them but we are to ourselves and to the neutral world. It is our duty to bring the war to an end as quickly as possible. To do that we must make sacrifices. We must raise and equip an army and send it to France or Russia.

The war was started by Germany. Let it be finished by the United States.
