BIG STREET PARADE OVER TWO MILES LONG

Fortune Spent in Greatest
Animal Pageant Ever
Produced.

There is a free for everybody street parade at 10:30 in the morning, giving one an idea of the numerous animals of rare and unusual species that will be seen educated to the highest standard of circus performers in the unusual program.

Mr. Barnes, often referred to as the "Wizard of Animal Education," has succeeded in teaching to act the only group of tigers, zebras and camels. The only singing donkey in the world is an act of the ordinary attraction. BOYS JOIN MARINES BE- CAUSE THEY ARE NECESSARY

Washington, May 5.—Although the United States Marine Corps made the announcement on April 28 that they had reached their then authorized war strength of 17,400 men, the Necessary men were secured two weeks before that time, and were under training.

Two brothers who were anxious to be "First to Fight," were enlisted Friday, April 13. They were Robert Z., and Thomas B. Necessary, sons of Mrs. Sallie Necessary of Red Rock, Texas.

"The response of red-blooded Americans to their country's call for additional Marines has been particularly gratifying," said Major General George Barnett, Commandant of the Marine Corps, "and we anticipate no difficulty in securing the 12,000 more which are likely to be authorized any day, and for which recruiting has already been started."
