STRATEGY OF THE BOER.

De Wet's Clever Escape When Hammed In by the Enemy.

Of the three great figures that emerged on the Boer side in the war of defense that developed after Ladysmith, Botha, De Wet and Delarey, De Wet was the most impressive. His face was a study in resistance, says Harold Spender in "General Botha—The Career and the Man." Looking on him, one could understand the fear that he inspired in his own men. But it was his schemes of escape, almost miraculous in their cunning, that perplexed an empire and puzzled a planet.

One evening after a long day's march—so he told us—all his wanderings seemed to have come to an end. The lights of the British bivouac fires twinkled from every point of the horizon. De Wet, as was his wont, went apart from his men and sat alone in dumb despair. Then there came to him softly one of those wonderful scouts who served him so well. The scout had discovered a slight gap in the British lines between two regiments that were not quite keeping touch.

In a moment De Wet was on his feet. Within an hour every horse's foot was muffled with cloth or wool and every wagon wheel was swathed. The Boer campfires were lighted and were left burning brightly. Then the whole Boer force crept out through the darkness of the night in utter silence, penetrated the gap in the British lines and started on a new course of fugitive warfare.

PORTLAND RED CROSS WORKERS ARE ACTIVE

Portland, Ore., May 7.—Preparing for the days when American boys will be wounded on the battlefields of France, the workroom of the Portland chapter of the American Red Cross was thrown open today to all who desire to assist in making bandages, hospital linens and surgical dressings. Three classes of instructors working under the direction of Miss Maybelle L. Feusier, of San Francisco, completed their course last week, and are ready to give instruction. The work rooms will be open from 10 to 12 and from 1 to 4 on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays each week. The rooms are located in a downtown department store.

BIG PACKERS WOULD FREEZE OUT COMPETITION

Astoria, Ore., May 7.—With the highest prices ever paid for fish, 2,000 fishermen are covering the lower Columbia river in what promises to freeze out the smaller cannerymen along the river. The big packers have adopted a price of 10 cents a pound for ordinary salmon with bonuses for larger fish. Catches up to today show the season started May 1, have been unusually good.

PORTLAND WILL STAGE A PREPAREDNESS PARADE

Portland, Ore., May 7.—Portland's unique "hoe parade" arrangements for which are being completed today, will be staged on the evening of May 12. Thousands of Portlanders are expected to walk through downtown streets, each carrying a hoe or other garden tool and each wearing old clothes. The Citizens' Unification league is in charge of the demonstration, which is intended to promote the cause of food preparedness.
