TANGENT BOY NARROWLY MISSES GIVING BAD WOUND

Thursday evening when an auto bearing J. M. Hawkins, Wm. Fortmiller, C. E. Sox and G. H. Crowell, was returning from Crawfordsville, one of a group of small boys playing by the roadside near Tangent threw a rock at the car. The stone struck Mr. Sox squarely between the eyes and caused a painful injury for a little while. It was in this vicinity a few months ago, that some boys threw rocks, one of which struck A. C. Schmitt in the eye as he passed. He was several weeks recovering from the effect of the blow and narrowly missed losing his eyesight.

Mr. Hawkins, who was driving the car, insisted on going back and the boy was tracked to his home where his mother was informed of the facts. The echoing reports which rent the air as the car drove on toward Albany spoke of the manner in which this parent approved of her son's actions.

The fact that some one is not seriously injured by this practice of throwing rocks at passing rigs and autos is miraculous, and some day a bad accident may result that will go hard with the offender. The members of yesterday's party were unanimous in declaring that something should be done to stop such recklessness.

ADVERTISEMENT FOR STREET IMPROVEMENT

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock, p. m., May 23, 1917, for the improvement of Baker street from the south line of third street to the north line of Ninth street, in said City of Albany.

Said improvement to be made in the following manner, to-wit:

First: By grading said street to the proper subgrade.
Second: By paving the roadway of said street full width with full intersections with asphaltic concrete pavement on an asphaltic concrete foundation.

Third: By laying and constructing asphaltic concrete headers.

Fourth: By constructing catch basins.

Fifth: By constructing inlets.

Sixth: By laying vitrified sewer pipe.

Said improvement to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of the City of Albany, and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the City Recorder of said City where said plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 8 o'clock, p. m., May 23, 1917.

No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany, in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid, to be forfeited on fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in a sum equal to fifty per cent of the amount of bid of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said improvement prior to the fifteenth day of July, 1917, under a liquidated penalty for damages of \$25.00 per day for each and every day of delay beyond that date.
