ADVERTISEMENT FOR STREET IMPROVEMENT

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock, p. m., May 23, 1917, for the improvement of Baker street from the south line of third street to the north line of Ninth street, in said City of Albany.

Said improvement to be made in the following manner, to-wit:

- First: By grading said street to the proper subgrade.
- Second: By paving the roadway of said street full width with full intersections with asphaltic concrete pavement on an asphaltic concrete foundation.
- Third: By laying and constructing asphaltic concrete headers.
- Fourth: By constructing catch basins.
- Fifth: By constructing inlets.
- Sixth: By laying vitrified sewer pipe.

Said improvement to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of the City of Albany, and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the City Recorder of said City where said plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 8 o'clock, p. m., May 23, 1917.

No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany, in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid, to be forfeited on fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in a sum equal to fifty per cent of the amount to be paid under such contract, for the faithful performance of the work and within ten days after notification of award of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said improvement prior to the fifteenth day of July, 1917, under a liquidated penalty for damages of \$25.00 per day for each and every day of delay beyond that date.

The Council reserves the right to reject all bids deemed unreasonable.

G. A. R. HOLD INTERESTING MEETING SATURDAY

The meeting last Saturday of McPherson Post, No. 5, G. A. R., was a very interesting one, with 25 comrades present, the largest number in recent years. The invitation of Rev. C. E. Gibson of the Albany M. E. church, to hold the Memorial Sabbath day services of the G. A. R. under his ministrations, was unanimously accepted by a rising vote, as was done by the Ladies of Fair Oaks Circle, No. 1, G. A. R., at its last meeting. A committee of three, composed of Comrades C. M. Westbrook, Dr. Joseph Meyers and R. Richardson were appointed to confer with a like committee of the local Spanish War veterans, to make arrangements for the Memorial day exercises etc.

It was arranged that Patriotic Instructor Rev. Maxwell Phillips and with him one or two other G. A. R. comrades should visit all the schools in the city, taking each in turn from day to day, during the week preceding the Memorial Sunday services, dates to be arranged with Superintendent of City Schools, C. V. Goettlicher. A resolution was passed urging the authorities at Washington to send as soon as possible a contingent of the Volunteer Army to Europe to assist the Allies in the war against Germany. The Past Adjutant was authorized to purchase one gross of small flags to be given to the school children taking part in the patriotic parade upon Decoration Day.

The purpose is to make this day the grandest ever held in Albany.
