THE THRIFT MOVEMENT

One of the greatest dangers that confront us at this moment is misguided thrift, declares a statement issued by S. W. Strauss, President of the American Society for Thrift.

"In our efforts to be patriotically economical, we find ourselves going to extremes in the opposite direction, which is just as great a menace as wastefulness and extravagance," said he. "One of the worst calamities that could befall our nation at any time would be to stop the wheels of industry, but more especially now.

"The point is to differentiate between destructive and constructive thrift. In times of peace or war, waste is reprehensible, but indiscriminate tight-fistedness is worse, because in such conditions the provident are made to suffer with the improvident.

"Because the whole nation suddenly has become conscious of the necessity of thrift, we as individuals should take care not to deflect from their normal courses the tides of the nation's money that turn the wheels of industry. America as a nation is not in any danger of running short of money, but we are threatened with a food shortage because on us rests the duty and responsibility of feeding our allies.

"Everyone can distinguish the difference between prudent living and wastefulness. If a man buys a suit of clothes, a pair of shoes or a hat, his money goes into legitimate circulation and furnishes uses for capital and employment for labor.

"The American people have responded in a grand way to the needs of the hour. We are going to conserve our resources and increase our food supply in a way that will astonish the world, but in doing this we stand face to face with economic hardships unless each individual is governed by common sense, prudence and foresight."

PORTLAND WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REPORT

North Portland, Ore., May 16.—Yesterday's cattle market was rather a slow and sticky affair with about 1000 head in the pens. Demand from killers was limited due to the heavy purchases made last week. There was a very good demand from out of town butchers which put some strength in the market and took quite a string at steady prices, although the bulk of the sales were on a lower basis relatively ranging from \$10 to \$15.00; medium grades of beef were the best sellers at steady prices, while prime steers sold mostly 25 cents lower. Common beef, that is dairy bred stuff suffered a loss of 50 cents. Several loads of prime heavy steers brought \$10.85 which was the top, with good light steers from \$10.25 to \$10.50; medium grade sold around \$9.75 to \$10.00; with common steers down to \$8.00. There were only a few cows here, the best getting \$9.25 to \$9.50; with common stuff selling down to \$5.00. Best light veal calves sold steady at \$11.00; a bunch of baby beef heifers brought \$10.00. The general trend of the cattle market was slow, the pep it has shown the last few months being absent.

Hogs

Hog prices ranged mostly 10 to 15 cents higher, the top was \$16.00 for three loads with another load at \$15.85, the bulk of sales were made at \$15.65 to \$15.75 with a few light loads down to \$15.50. Pigs suffered a severe set back of about 75 cents due to the heavy receipts of light hogs during the last few weeks, the bulk going at \$13.00.

Sheep

The sheep market is unchanged, only a couple of loads of mixed valley sheep were here.

ADVERTISEMENT FOR STREET IMPROVEMENT

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock, p. m., May 23, 1917, for the improvement of Baker street from the south line of third street to the north line of Ninth street, in said City of Albany.

Said improvement to be made in the following manner, to-wit:

First: By grading said street to the proper subgrade.

Second: By paving the roadway of said street full width with full intersections with asphaltic concrete pavement on an asphaltic concrete foundation.

Third: By laying and constructing asphaltic concrete headers.

Fourth: By constructing catch basins.

Fifth: By constructing inlets.

Sixth: By laying vitrified sewer pipe.

Said improvement to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of the City of Albany, and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the City Recorder of said City where said plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 8 o'clock, p. m., May 23, 1917.

No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany, in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid, to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in a sum equal to fifty per cent of the amount to be paid under such contract, for the faithful performance of the work and within ten days after notification of award of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said improvement prior to the fifteenth day of July, 1917, under a liquidated penalty for damages of \$25.00 per day for each and every day of delay beyond that date.

The Council reserves the right to reject all bids deemed unreasonable.
