BENTON COUNTY MAN

PLOWS AT NIGHT

Big Tractor Plow is Equipped
With Searchlight; Other
Farmers Follow Example

F. O. Harris, a Lompoc, Cal., farmer, who came to Corvallis during the winter months, purchasing the Peter Rickard farm about 10 miles south of Corvallis, where he and his family now reside, believes in the modern methods of farming and the plowing on his farm is done by means of the operation of a tractor plow. And because of the lateness of the spring season, Mr. Harris is operating the big machine at night as well as during the day, a large searchlight on the tractor providing the necessary light. Mr. Harris already has 100 acres of his farm planted to white beans and is fast preparing his farm land for the bountiful crops he proposes to raise. According to reports from Corvallis, a number of Benton county farmers will engage in the work of plowing by night in order that early harvests may result.—Corvallis Gazette Times.

DEMURRER UPHOLD IN
LAND GRANT CASE

Portland, May 17.—Circuit Judge George Bingham of Marion county, upheld the demurrer in the injunction suit to keep the Bean bill off the ballot and ruled that the Bean bill should go on the ballot. An immediate appeal is planned. The attack on the bill is based on the contention that the legislature did not legally pass the measure. The bill would put grant lands on the tax rolls.

FARM PATRIOTISM

Buyers at the Stock Yards are beginning to make sharp differences between prime fat stuff and young immature animals. This is particularly noticeable the last few days in the hog division, pigs under 150 pounds dropping off sharply to 13 cents, while 200-pound hogs and up are going from \$15.75 to \$16.00. It is expected that the spread between these two grades will become greater and it may have the effect of keeping these pigs on the farm. In these times of food shortage it would seem the patriotic duty of every farmer to keep all of his live stock to its fullest maturity. He may make no more money perhaps for the time being, but he is doing his "bit" toward food production. A young pig pounds at 13 cents grosses \$19.50; the same pig weighing, say, 200 pounds at 16 cents brings \$32.00, allowing a lump sum of \$12.50 to put on the additional 50 pounds of fat. It is generally conceded that four pounds of wheat will make one pound of pork, therefore the wheat necessary to finish the animal would bring \$3.75 abashed. The most important item, however, is not the fact that the farmer gets six bits or a dollar a bushel more for his wheat than it is worth on the market, but that one-third more meat has been produced. The farmer who produces 200 pounds of pork where 150 pounds "grew" before is doing just as patriotic a duty as the man who buys "liberty bonds." By all means, let us encourage everybody to keep their young animals at home.—Live Stock Reporter.

STREET IMPROVEMENT

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock, p. m., May 23, 1917, for the improvement of Baker street from the south line of third street to the north line of Ninth street, in said City of Albany.

Said improvement to be made in the following manner, to-wit:
First: By grading said street to the proper subgrade.

Second: By paving the roadway of said street full width with full intersections with asphaltic concrete pavement on an asphaltic concrete foundation.

Third: By laying and constructing asphaltic concrete headers.

Fourth: By constructing catch basins.

Fifth: By constructing inlets.

Sixth: By laying vitrified sewer pipe.

Said improvement to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of the City of Albany, and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the City Recorder of said City where said plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 8 o'clock, p. m., May 23, 1917.

No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany, in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid, to be forfeited or fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in a sum equal to fifty per cent of the amount to be paid under such contract, for the faithful performance of the work and within ten days after notification of award of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said improvement prior to the fifteenth day of July, 1917, under a liquidated penalty for damages of \$25.00 per day for each and every day of delay beyond that date.
