SENATOR LANE

If we were asked to name the three traits which stood out most prominently in the character of the late Senator Harry Lane, we should unhesitatingly say, his absolute honesty and fearlessness, loyalty to his friends and his hatred of sham and hypocrisy, and his sense of humor.

Senator Lane was not an orator as the world would understand the meaning of the word. He was, however, one of the most effective public speakers in the state. He was effective because he had the faculty of impressing his audience with his sincerity of purpose. He made up in integrity for what he lacked in the flow of language.

Few men in the public life of the state have a cleaner record of loyalty to those whom they claim as friends. If Lane ever betrayed a friend the writer never learned of it. If he ever broke a political promise it has never been given publicity. In the language of the streets, he was "on the level," and played the game fair.

Harry Lane loved simplicity and hated ostentation. He despised the hypocrite and egotist. He had a contempt for the empty and shallow pretense that typifies the social life of the average American city and preferred the association of a few intimate personal friends to that of playing a major role in the social drama at the national capital. Above everything else he had a saving sense of humor which endeared him to his friends and enabled him to bridge over many an embarrassing political situation.

Senator Lane passes out of Oregon politics with a clean record and the state is better for having known him and accepted his service.

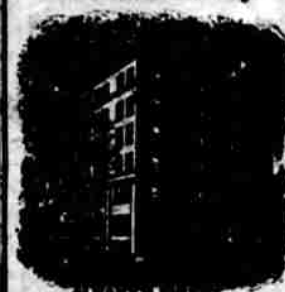
