DON'T SELL BREEDING ANIMALS—THEY ARE THE FOR LIVE STOCK INDUSTRY

"Don't sell your breeding animals unless you can replace them immediately with better ones," is the message the United States Department of Agriculture is sending to farmers and stockmen everywhere. "Don't let the temptation of high prices now being offered for live stock or undue fear of the prices asked for many popular feeds mislead you into selling a cow or sow that will drop the golden calf or litters. Such near-sighted profit jacking or lack of courage, if wide-spread, would strike at the foundation of the country's live stock industry and cripple it for years to come. As there is a shortage of meat animals throughout the world, we cannot hope to import new breeding stock to replace those we foolishly have killed off. Our own breeding animals, therefore, must be regarded as the seed essential to the domestic meat supply of the nation.

Don't sell Breeding Animals. Maintain and increase breeding herds. Feed cheap roughages. Feed live stock as little human food as possible.

"Feeds not available or needed for human consumption should be used as largely as possible in feeding live stock. By feeding straw or corn stover, especially for wintering mature stockers and breeding animals, farmers will make the best possible use of these roughages. In this way a large proportion of the straw and stover ordinarily burned or wasted can be manufactured into meat and milk. Grain sorghums, wherever they are available, should be fed to release corn for human uses. Grain, where fed, should be used as economically as possible.

"Every animal should be a factory for turning into food material inedible for human beings. This will necessitate changes in many feeding formulas and stockmen are urged to apply at once to the United States Department of Agriculture or their state agricultural colleges for information as to the most effective and economical methods of feeding live stock under existing emergency conditions."

Soap Bubbles and Portraits.

Professor Boys of England, experimenting with bubbles obtained some very large ones, which in the sunshine changed colors so beautifully that he conceived the idea of using them as backgrounds for photographs.

The large bubbles were blown with an ordinary bellows, says the Popular Science Monthly. The soap solution was heated and a large mouthed funnel was dipped into it. The bellows, connected with the funnel, was then worked very gently. Bubbles with as great a circumference as two and a half feet were easily obtained.

Bananas.

Bananas, if they are unripe, may be used with advantage as a vegetable. Cut the fruit in halves, stew them for twenty-five minutes in just a little water, drain, cover them with a cream sauce such as you use for cauliflower and serve them hot. The ripe fruit is a delicious garnish to meat. Cut round slices from ripe, firm bananas, fry them in butter and lay a few on the top of broiled steak as it goes to table.

LIFE INSURANCE MEN TO SELL LIBERTY BONDS

The life insurance men in the United States expect to devote the 5th and 6th of June exclusively to selling Liberty Loan Bonds. The Albany agents are planning to help out and expect to canvass Albany as far as possible on the above dates. This is to give the public a hint of what is coming that they may have their subscriptions in mind on those days.

Bonds are sold in denominations of \$50, \$100, \$500, \$1,000 and on easy installments, so that all can carry some, and it is to be hoped that the response by the public will be a large one.

These bonds bring 3 1/2 per cent. interest and run for thirty years, though they may be paid off in fifteen years, at the Government's option.
