THE AMERICAN POSITION

In a letter to Congressman Heflin of Alabama, the President clearly sums up the American position in regard to the World War.

The President says:

"I have again and again stated the very serious and long-continued wrongs which the imperial German government has perpetrated against the rights, the commerce and the citizens of the United States.

"The list is long and overwhelming. No nation that respects itself or the right of humanity could have borne these wrongs any longer.

"Our objects in going into the war have been stated with equal clearness. The whole of the conception which I take to be the conception of our fellow countrymen with regard to the outcome of the war and the terms of its settlement I set forth with the utmost explicitness in an address to the Senate of the United States on January 22 last.

"Again in my message to Congress on April last these objects were stated in unmistakable terms.

"I can conceive no purpose in seeking to becloud this matter except the purpose of weakening the hands of the Government and making the part which the United States is to play in this great struggle for human liberty an inefficient and hesitating part. We have entered the war for our own reasons and with our own objects clearly stated, and shall forgo neither the reasons nor the objects.

"There is no hate in our hearts for the German people, but there is a resolve which cannot be shaken even by misrepresentation to overcome the pretensions of the autocratic government which acts upon purposes to which the German people have never consented."

MARKET NEWS

North Portland, Ore., May 22.—A moderate run of cattle was on the market again yesterday, demand was fairly good, coming from butchers although large killers were slow buyers due to the fact that they had a surplus on hand. Another strengthening factor was a brisk feeder and stocker trade. Only a few loads of strictly good beef was included which were the best sellers at strong prices compared with last week's slow clock. Best beef steers sold from \$9.50 to \$10.00, with fair to good grass steers from \$8.75 to \$9.25; ordinary steers sold from \$8.00 to \$8.50 while thin off-grade stuff brought from \$6.50 to \$7.50. Best beef cows brot from \$8.25 to \$8.75 with fair to good ones at \$7.50 to \$8.00. Ordinary cows and heifers brought \$6.50 to \$7.00 while thin dairy cows of low dressing value sold from \$4.00 to \$6.00. Best heavy beef bulls brought \$7.50 with good light ones around \$7.00. Thin Jersey bulls sold from \$5.00 to \$6.50.

Hogs
Bulk of yesterday's hog business was done at \$15.60 to \$15.75 for four to choice mixed butchers with good loads at \$15.85 to \$15.90. Demand was better than at any time during the week. Pigs sold from \$13.00 to \$13.50 with scattered sales up to \$14.00.

Sheep receipts continue light and prices held firm. Current quotations are: Spring lambs good to choice, \$12.50 to \$13.50; spring lambs fair to good, \$11.50 to \$12.50; spring lambs, culls, \$11 to \$12; shorn lambs good to choice, heavy weights, \$11 to \$12; shorn wethers, good to choice, \$10.50 to \$11; shorn wethers fair to good, \$10 to \$10.50; shorn ewes, good to choice, \$9.50 to \$10; shorn ewes, fair to good, \$9 to \$9.50.
