ENLISTED MEN AND RESERVES NEED NOT REGISTER

All Others Must Have Little Green Cards After June 5.

Portland, May 29.—Members of the National Guard will not be required to register on War Census Day, June 5.

The first regulations issued by the War Department required that National Guardsmen between the ages of 21 and 30 years, inclusive, who had not actually been called into the Federal service, must register. Instructions were so issued by the Adjutant General of Oregon to all company commanders in the state.

land yesterday afternoon to be received from Washington that President Wilson himself has ruled that members of the National Guard are already subject to military service under Federal authority, so will not be subject to selective conscription, nor required to register.

As the regulations now stand, the only men between the ages of 21 and 30 years, inclusive, who will not have to register on War Census Day are soldiers and sailors of the regular army, navy, and Marine corps, soldiers of the National Guard, and the reserves thereof.

All other men of the designated ages, without any exception, and including aliens as well as citizens, must register. Illness or absence from home precincts on War Census Day is no excuse, though special methods have been provided for registration of the sick and absentees in advance.

The penalty for failing to register is imprisonment, without alternative of a fine.

ASTORIA PROMISES STARTLING DISCLOSURES IN NEAR FUTURE

Governor May Be Asked to Send Militia to Clean Up Town.

Astoria, Or., May 29.—Startling disclosures are promised at a mass meeting in the First Methodist church here tonight and an attempt will probably be made to induce Governor Withycombe to send state officers to Astoria to clean up the city. The city and county authorities are said to be cognizant of the state of affairs.

R. P. Hutton, state superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league, recently spent four days in Astoria investigating conditions and information regarding the bootlegging, gambling, and immorality which he collected will be made public. Hutton turned facts gathered in his probe over to local civic organizations, which got behind the clean-up movement.

By special invitation the mayor of Astoria, members of the city council, the city attorney, the chief of police, the district attorney, the sheriff and his deputies and the constables have been asked to attend the meeting.
