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MANY GERMANS
MADE PRISONERSSeventy-five Thousand Taken
in the Recent Allied Offensives Says Paris ReportAUSTRIAN LOSSES ON
ITALIAN FRONT HEAVYThree Hundred Thousand in
Killed and Missing Reported
as Enemy Losses

French Headquarters, June 1.—Between April 15, and May 24, the French made prisoners of 31,829 Germans according to headquarters lists.

Adding the British and Italian captured it is estimated 75,000 were made prisoners during the three great offensives.

Rome, June 1.—The great Italian offensive has already cost the Austrians 300,000 in killed, wounded and missing, it is conservatively estimated.

The Italians are now consolidating and reinforcing their lines with new troops, and reorganizing their positions. They are continually inflicting frightful losses on the enemy by repelling counter attacks.

General Cadorna halted our advance today, permitting the bringing up of new supplies, in preparation for further attacks.

Small Engagements

London, June 1.—British pushed forward in a number of successful local engagements last night. General Haig reported. Dispatches from the front say the British at the Loos attack reached the German third line.

The French repulsed violent German counter attacks, Paris stated.

SLACKERS CAUGHT CROSS-
ING MEXICAN BORDER

Laredo, Texas, June 1.—Checking the exodus of so-called slackers, government agents refused to allow ten of conscription age to cross the border into Mexico. The first two Americans detained were held by the bureau of investigation charged with "seeking to leave the United States to avoid military registration."

IN HOUSE NEAR THOMAS

WILL PROSECUTE
ARMY SLACKERSPresident Issues Proclamation
That Will Lead to

Washington, June 1.—President Wilson issued a proclamation warning slackers that attempts to evade registration by leaving the country will expose them to prosecution on their return.

Washington, June 1.—The War Department decided to reduce the cantonment camps from 30 to 46. Insofar as possible the camps will be established in the South because of better conditions there.

Secretary Baker said the change is due to the cost. Congress is considering a seventy million dollar appropriation. The estimated cost of the thirty-two cantonments is \$150,000,000.

MILLIONAIRE FATHER
FIGHTS TO PAY RANSOMSon Kidnapped; Father Hunts
Criminals to Pay Over Sum
of \$6,000

Springfield, Mo., June 1.—Crazed with grief and anxiety over the kidnapping of his son, J. H. Keet, millionaire retired banker, blames friends for failure to recover his boy from abductors last night.

Following directions Keet last night stole away to meet the kidnappers and carried with him \$6,000 ransom. Before leaving he asked friends not to attempt to follow him. The kidnappers' letter said that he alone must take the money to the kidnappers.

Friends fearing foul play followed Keet all night. The kidnappers failed to appear at the appointed spot. Keet drove all night.

He intends to hunt the kidnappers with the ransom to-night. The police fear that others, knowing the circumstances, may attack him.

AGED MAN COMMITTED
TO STATE INSANE ASYLUM

Charlie Pyburn, aged 70, an inmate of the county poor farm, was today committed to the state insane asylum. He was examined by Dr. J. P. Wallace. For the past few weeks he has had hallucinations of sight and hearing, and threatened to commit suicide. He is a brother of R. H. Pyburn of Halsey.

MAY SHIPPING
LOSSES LIGHTERAllied Navies are Destroying
More Than Heretofore Says
British OfficialGERMANY INCREASING
NUMBER OF DIVERSEngland Has Reserve Supply
of Cereals to Last Her Twelve
weeks; says report

London, June 1.—"The May shipping losses were the lightest so far in the submarine war because the British are destroying more submarines than before," Kennedy Jones, food director declared.

"The Germans are meeting this with similarly increased output of submarines."

England has a reserve supply of cereals sufficient for twelve weeks but it is uncertain as to whether or not this will be maintained until harvest. If it falls below seven weeks, local famines will result."

ALBANY BUYS \$62,300.00
WORTH OF LIBERTY BONDS

That the people of Albany are investing in liberty bonds is indicated by reports given out to a Democrat representative this morning by the three local banks which show an aggregate investment of \$62,300.00.

The first National Bank placed \$30,200.00 worth of the bonds, J. W. Cusick & Co., \$27,100.00, and the Albany State Bank \$5,000.00.

COMMISSIONER IRVINE
PROTESTS STATEMENTSClaims Wrong Impression is
Given by Figures Quoted by
Road Bond Advocates

County Commissioner J. D. Irvine, in an interview this morning takes exception to advertising matter being used by proponents of the \$6,000,000 road bond bill in this county. He refers particularly to a lantern slide being used in a local theatre, which states that the cost of maintenance of the Pacific Highway through Linn county in 1916 was \$16,000.

"I want to protest against the inaccuracy of this statement," says Mr. Irvine, "and brand it as absolutely false and misleading. The advocates of the measure in this county have taken part of the records of the county court and utterly distorted them to make capital for their own purpose."

"Linn county did spend something like \$16,000 on her roads in the eight road districts adjacent to the Pacific Highway in 1916, but a very little of this amount was spent on the Pacific Highway itself. Only about five per cent of this amount was spent on the highway between Jefferson and Harrisburg, or \$830, to be exact."

"The records of the county court will show the following figures to be exact for the amounts spent by the eight road supervisors in their various districts: District No. 11, J. D. Winkley, Albany, \$300; No. 12, John Maxwell, Albany, \$50; No. 1, Jeff Isom, \$60; No. 10, W. C. Scott, Tangent, \$105; No. 4, J. C. Standish, Halsey, \$100; No. 3, Ernest Pugh, Shedd, \$115; No. 32, A. C. Christenson, Harrisburg, \$50; No. 5, W. W. Cook, Harrisburg, \$50; total, \$830."

"All of the above amounts were for maintenance. In addition to this considerable new work was done, but \$16,000 covers the entire cost of all work done in these eight districts in 1916. It must also be remembered that the Pacific Highway between Harrisburg and Jefferson is but 35 miles, while the total road mileage in these eight districts is over 600 miles."
