SATURDAY IS COW-BOY HAT DAY IN ALBANY

SOAP AND WATER IN BATTERY CONSTRUCTION

"Probably not one motor car owner in a thousand knows what an important part in the construction of his battery plain soap and water take," says Mr. Preston, the local Willard expert.

"This is particularly true," says Mr. Preston, "of the Willard Storage Battery Company, because this company makes all its plates—some hundred thousand a day—by hand.

"The battery plate, as most motorists know, is a skeleton of an anti-mony and lead alloy and then this skeleton is filled with a lead oxide. The handling of lead continuously in almost any form almost invariably leads to lead poisoning unless the workman is very careful, and it is because of the fact that all men in the Willard factory who are working with these lead oxides are compelled at regular intervals to take hot shower baths.

"These baths are located in a room leading directly off the plate making department and might properly be called a part of the plate making shop.

"The men who make Willard Storage battery plates are especially privileged in other directions too. Owing to the danger of lead poisoning these men are permitted to work only about half a day—that is, half the average working day. They have attained such a great degree of skill and swiftness in their work, however, that even in their short day they turn out a very good day's work.

"Many battery manufacturers make the battery plates by machinery, but it has been pretty well proved that machine made plates are not satisfactory in the long run as hand made ones. The oxide must be packed into the frame uniformly and solidly. It is not possible to do this perfectly with machinery. And so, despite the fact that hand made plates cost more than machine made ones, they are used in Willard batteries.

"The proof of the pudding is in the eating. We service men very rarely hear of Willard plates going bad, and then the batteries have been badly abused."

GOVERNMENT QUARANTINES PINE TREE SHIPMENTS

LIBERTY LOAN OFFERS YOU AN OPPORTUNITY

Washington, June 1.—A great war is a nation's supreme test. To conduct a war successfully requires the marshaling of all of the nation's resources as well as their physical strength. It is the part of the young man to make the nation's physical strength felt on the firing line. It is the part of those who cannot give their services at the front to be the sustaining forces behind the line. It is the part of the women to fill in the roles that the men have been playing and to keep up the nation's efficiency. It is the part of those who can afford it to lend their capital to enable the nation to prosecute the war with the greatest effectiveness.

The Liberty Loan offers this opportunity to every American patriot.

It is inconceivable that the people of the United States will ever be called upon to meet the privations which this war forced upon the people of Europe. European nations have already expended fifty billions of dollars of their resources to prosecute the war and their people have given, not only their lives, but they have subjected themselves to tremendous sacrifices in every way. Five million European homes have been visited by death itself. Fine cities have given place to ruins. Rich and poor have gone on government food rations; individual liberty has been sacrificed to national unity of action in order to gain national efficiency. Women who have been accustomed to fine clothes and the constant round of entertainment, have taken their place as day laborers in munition factories.

All of this sacrifice has been made for a cause that is as much ours as theirs. The violation of the neutrality of Belgium was just as much an affront to America as to Great Britain. German autocracy threatens the perpetuity of free institutions everywhere alike.

The important thing is for Americans to realize that this is our war and as participants, we must do our utmost to bring it to a successful conclusion. The thing which is most available and which can be given at once is our wealth. It is the patriotic duty therefore, of every American to help make the Liberty Loan an overwhelming success.

It is the unusual privilege of Americans to take this first step in helping the fighting allies without great sacrifice. Even if you do not wish to place your subscription on the basis of patriotism, you might reasonably place it on the basis of investment. A 3 1/2 per cent government bond, tax free, is an excellent investment.

The purchase of Liberty Bonds to the extent of \$50 means that you are lending your resources to pay the keep of one soldier for ten days in the trenches of France. Surely you can do that much. Many can do much more.

"To such a task we can dedicate our lives and our fortunes, everything that we are and everything that we have with the pride of those who know that the day has come when America has been privileged to send her blood and her might for the principles that gave her birth and happiness and the peace which she has treasured."

ARGENTINES THINK U. S. WANTED TO FIGHT

Buenos Aires, June 1.—The Argentine view is that the United States is going to war rather because she has a good excuse than because she has a good reason. The Argentines who do think the United States has an adequate reason are also of the opinion that this reason was not the consideration which led her into war. It is generally their judgment that the United States wanted to fight. They believe the United States to be a victim of the same sort of psychological influence which, after the com-

mission of a sensational crime or a suicide, often causes the incident to be imitated by others.

They call attention to the fact that North Americans are accepting universal military service, food control and other big changes in the interests of the national service. The Argentine idea is that North Americans actually want to suffer hardships and privations because other people are doing so. That is why Argentine is rather chilly toward the attitude North America has taken.

TRENCH TALES

With the British Armies Afraid, June 1.—Three British Tommies, just escaped from a German prison, told of extraordinarily bad treatment. They crossed many lines of enemy trenches in the escape.

"We were first imprisoned in a chalk pit and then transferred to a camp where there were already 1000 British, French, Russians and Algerians," said one. "German officers threatened to shoot some prisoners for refusing information. We were housed in leaky huts, without overcoats or blankets in the coldest weather. Sometimes we worked on roads within range of our own guns. Our food was black bread, thin soup and weak coffee. Bathing facilities were nil. We were driven to work under penalty or whippings. There were no doctors, and the sick had to toil as hard as any of us."

GERMANS BARRED FROM 20 ZONES IN NEW YORK

New York, June 1.—America's heaviest blow at alien enemies in New York fell today when the U. S. marshal's order forbidding Germans to enter 20 barred zones around armories and naval militia stations in this city became effective. Between 15,000 and 20,000 males over 14 years of age are hit, it is estimated. The zones are of a half mile radius.

Hundreds of permits were issued to Germans who had lived for years in the prohibited districts and bore good reputations, to persons employed there, who could get forceful recommendations from their employers, and to those who faced ruin if unable to enter the zones to conduct their business.

Those who were permitted to continue living in the districts cannot be visited by German friends, as no permits were granted "for social purposes." The forbidden areas in some instances, took in German clubs, restaurants, and hotels. Under the rule, enemy aliens can pass through the zones on public conveyances, but cannot alight en route. Germans without permits caught in the barred districts will be interned.

America's warlike attitude is so unexpected to Germany that her naval officers disabled her steamships in America barely two months in advance of possible hostilities.—Philadelphia North American.
