TRIBUTE PAID TO LATE SENATOR LANE

Kindness and Sympathy for
Others Were Greatest Charac-
teristics of Senator

I wish to offer a brief tribute to
the late Senator Harry Lane, speak-
ing not as a relative but as one who
knew him intimately for the last twen-
ty years.

I notice that many in speaking of
him emphasize particularly his moral
courage and undoubted honesty of
purpose, while some who knew him
intimately believe that he was more
particularly characterized by kind-
ness of heart and sympathy for the
sufferings of humanity. It was this
certainty which defined his character
above all else and it was this also
which determined his action in many
important issues, notably in the vote,
which brought so much criticism upon
him in the past few months.

As he often said and stated to me
in a personal note, his one thought
was of the horrors of war and the
burden of sorrow it would bring to
many an American home. The great
majority of his colleagues felt that
the sacrifice was imperatively de-
manded and had to be made by the
homes of America, and we generally
agree that they were right in taking
this view of the question.

The late senator was not a Catholic
as everyone knows, but he was kind
enough to encourage me from my
school days in the decision I had taken
to prepare for the ministry of the
church.

A keen observer of the condition of
human society, he frequently spoke
of the valuable service, which the
church is rendering to men through
her institutions of charity—her hospi-
tals, her orphanages, her homes for
the aged and her Magdalen homes for
fallen girls.

A characteristic utterance of his
was that the clergy should not ask
the down-and-outs to come to church
services, where they would only feel
embarrassed, as he thought, but the
clergy should go to them wherever
they might be and by the acts of
kindness and persuasion lift them
from their unhappy condition. His
pity for this class was intense and
he suffered much because of their
spiritual misery.

It is not generally known that he
was almost totally blind in the last
weeks of his life and he suffered
much from this affliction. He grieved
at the thought that his eyesight was
perhaps gone for life, but he seemed
hopeful almost to the last of recover-
ing his health.

Withal, he was cheerful and ever
thoughtful of others. He died as
simply as he lived, a man of immense
sympathy and of great singleness of
purpose. Even men who weep little
have wept for him and those who had
him as an intimate friend, feel that
they have sustained an irreparable
loss.

Problems Needing Solution.

As examples of problems calling
aloud for solution Henry Le Chatelier,
the French scientist, names the follow-
ing: In glassmaking, the limits of the
variation of viscosity of glass in terms
of temperature and chemical composi-
tion; In metallurgy, the measurement
