Mrs. Elmer Churchill Saturday underwent an operation for the removal of her tonsils. It was performed by Dr. J. E. Bridgewater.

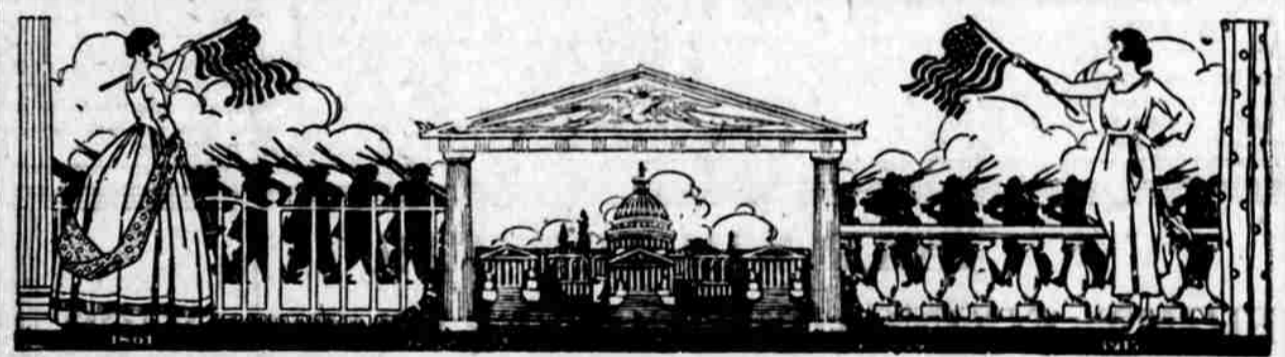
**Buys Studebaker—**

Pa Payments to be made as follows: 2 per cent on applications, 18 per cent June 28, 20 per cent July 30, 30 per cent August 15, and 30 per cent August 30.

Liberty Bonds pay 3 1-2 per cent interest which is due Dec. 15, and June 15.
