DOLLARS vs. KAISERISM

Have you bought a Liberty Bond? If not, why not? Albany and Linn County must stand up and be counted. Neither the county nor the county-seat can afford to be billed throughout the state as shirkers. We must do our share. We must be willing to do one of two things. Either shoulder a musket or shoulder a small debt which will enable us to buy a liberty bond and thus help win the war against the Kaiser.

The war in which the United States is engaged is a war of resources. It is a war wherein dollars and cents are the first line of defense. Our dollars must blaze the trail for the downfall of the Prussian Military caste. Our soldiers and the soldiers of our allies must be fed and clothed. Ammunition must be bought and transportation must be provided for our troops and supplies. All this costs money.

The government isn't asking a donation. It is merely asking patriotic American citizens to invest in the best and safest investment in the civilized world, a United States government bond.

Liberty Loan Bonds of the first issue of \$2,000,000 are to bear date of June 15, 1917, and to run for 30 years, except that the government reserves the right to pay them 15 years after date. If this right is not exercised by the government 15 years from date, the bonds will run the full 30 years. These bonds bear interest at 3 1/2 per cent per annum and the interest is payable semi-annually on the 15th day of December and the 15th day of June in each year.

SAVE THOSE EWE LAMBS SAYS U. S. GOVERNMENT

Washington, D. C., June 11.—Save every ewe lamb possible for breeding is the urgent message the Department of Agriculture is sending to sheep owners. Market for slaughter only those being absolutely worthless for breeding stock. There is a strong demand among farmers for breeding stock and owners of ewe lambs should have no trouble finding a breeding market for them through county agents or the state agricultural colleges. Sheep specialists of the Department believe that although prices for breeding stock now are high, those who start production of wool and mutton on a moderate scale will have no cause to regret purchasing breeding stock at present figures.
