HELPING THE KAISER

Every time a housewife buys a few extra sacks of flour or potatoes and stores them in expectation of an increase in the price, she helps the kaiser. She automatically raises the price of foodstuffs by obtaining more than she needs for immediate consumption.

Thus far there is no reason for the exceptionally high price of flour and other staple articles. The consumption is no greater now than it was three months ago but the speculative big and little, has cheated an artificial demand which has increased the cost of living and will continue to do so unless more patriotism and less thrift is exhibited by the consuming public.

"Buy today what you need today" should be the motto of every American home. Tomorrow will then take care of itself and the overhead charges of maintaining a home and a family will show no material increase during the continuance of the war.

The latter speculates either on a small or a large scale solely in the necessities of life and every time he puts food products in storage he makes it just that much more difficult for the poorer families to obtain enough nourishment to keep body and soul together. DANGER OF OVER-IRRIGATION
TOLD BY O. A. C. PROFESSORGardens Should Not Be Watered
Daily and Very Few Need
Moisture at Present.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., June 12.—Much damage to vegetable gardens at this time of the year is caused by over-irrigation. This warning to vegetable growers is made by Professor A. G. Bonquet of O. A. C., who states further that "owing to the wet spring, there is now plenty of moisture in western Oregon soils, and that irrigation is not necessary, except on coarse, sandy ground. They are further urged to examine the soil carefully before watering, for, although it may seem dry on the surface, there is still plenty of moisture at a depth of two or three inches. Where water is necessary, the best results are obtained if the irrigation is followed by a good cultivation as soon as the soil is in working condition.

In most cases cultivation is at present an efficient means of giving vegetables planted some weeks ago the necessary moisture, and the dry surface layer will prevent loss of water by evaporation. Cultivation enables the plant to get moisture in the most approved way, namely by taking it from below at the deep roots.

It is best not to cultivate the garden early in the morning while the dew is on the leaves, for it will tend to make the plant more susceptible to disease, and the foliage will become dirty and the pores through which the plants breathe will be closed up.

Under no circumstances is a garden irrigated once a day; in many instances not even once a week, unless the soil is sandy and quite porous. Vegetables suffer from damping off, stem rot and other fungous diseases when the ground is continually wet and compact.

Combs and the Hair.

The best comb for the hair is the hard rubber comb with smooth, rounded edges that will not cut the hair. A fine comb has many disadvantages; therefore the all purpose comb is to be preferred. A metal tooth comb tends to pull out good hair and is liable to wound and scratch the scalp. Never use a comb the teeth of which are broken. One should never try to save money at the expense of a good comb. The comb should be washed frequently in water in which ammonia has been added. Scrub out the teeth with a nailbrush and soap. A sun bath is also good for the comb.
