

### GERMANS MAKE AIR RAID ON BRITAIN

Thirty-one Loose Their Lives and Sixty-seven Injured in Bomb Attack

### SCHOOL HOUSE STRUCK BY BOMB; TEN ARE KILLED

One German Machine Brought Down; King George Offers Sympathy for Injured

London, June 13.—Germany's fourth recent aeroplane raid claimed a death toll of thirty-one dead and sixty-seven injured in London alone. Fifty aeroplanes formed the bombing squadron. Chancello of the Exchequer Law announced that one was downed.

German raiders appeared over the Essex coast shortly before noon. A bomb struck an elementary school and killed ten children and injured fifty. British anti-air craft guns and defense planes vigorously fought the invaders.

King George and Minister of War Derby hurried to the attacked section and offered sympathy.

### GARDEN SURVEY OF ALBANY IS COMPLETED

Honor Guard Girls Find 300 Gardens in Albany this Year; An Increase of 50 Per Cent

The Honor Guard girls have completed their survey of the gardens in Albany and report a considerable increase over 1916. The survey was made under the direction of the Food Preparedness Campaign directed by the Oregon Agricultural College and the United States Department of Agriculture.

The survey shows that there are 300 gardens comprising 64.5 acres, while in 1916, there were 200 gardens comprising 200 acres, or an increase of 50 per cent.

The increased acreage is principally in beans and potatoes. The family garden is cultivated as usual this year and many have added to this by planting an extra lot or two in potatoes or beans.

This survey does not include a large acreage planted to potatoes and beans in the country surrounding Albany by residents of this city. The general acreage is greatly increased in Linn county.

### PERSHING GIVEN ROUSING WELCOME IN FRANCE

Boulogne, France, June 13.—Cheering thousands welcomed General Pershing on French soil. Pershing arrived at 9:40 this morning. He made a quick and uneventful trip from England.

Paris is frantic with enthusiasm and the streets are massed with flag waving throngs which greeted Major General Pershing, Marshall Joffre, Vice Premier Viviani, Minister of War Penleve, American Ambassador Sharpe and a score of other dignitaries greeted the Americans. It is conservatively estimated that one hundred thousand persons thronged the streets.

Pershing will operate under Petrain, the French generalissimo, not the British commander.

### MEXICAN BANDITS ATTACK U.S. TROOPS

Patrol Troops of Eighth Cavalry Returns Fire But is Forced to Retreat

### FORTY IN BANDIT FORCE MADE THE ATTACK

Driven Back Across the Border With Three Killed; No Losses Among Americans

El Paso, June 13.—Forty Mexican bandits crossed the border fifteen miles east of El Paso and attacked a patrol troop of the Eighth cavalry.

The Americans were greatly outnumbered and were compelled to retreat after returning the Mexicans' fire. The bandits followed, reinforcements were rushed to the aid of the patrol squad and the Mexicans retreated across the border when they arrived. The Americans did not follow.

It is reported that three bandits were killed.

No Americans were killed or wounded. It is believed the Mexicans planned to raid Ysleta, a border town of 5000 population.

### TRADE COMMISSION IS AFTER LUMBER KINGS

Washington, June 13.—The Federal Trade commission issued a complaint charging that over two hundred western lumber companies with a conspiracy to defeat the plans to destroy the business of mail order houses engaged to selling lumber and building material.

The commission announced that the timber dealers will appear in Washington on July 31.

### FRANCE READY TO SIGN NEW RUSSIAN TREATY

Petrograd, June 13.—France formally notified Russia that she stands ready to make new agreements with the Democratic government, covering two nations future cooperation in the war.

### THREE SUITS FILED IN CIRCUIT COURT

W. S. Mott began suit today against the Clement Lumber company to recover \$2,687.16 alleged to be due as a result of a contract made between plaintiff and the defendant. May 11, 1916, C. J. Clement contracted to purchase timber on the claims of Dr. Mott of Salem, reporting to him once a month the amount of timber cut, sending him the railroad weight bill and \$1.50 per thousand for timber cut. In all 3,100,302 feet were cut, for which \$4740.30 should have been paid. Of this amount only \$2,023.61 has been paid.

### SENATE STRIKES HARD AT LIQUOR

Committee Agrees to Bill Prohibiting Manufacture of Intoxicants During War

### HARD FIGHT IS EXPECTED IN BOTH HOUSES

Will Be Presented as Separate Bill and Not as Part of Food Control Legislation

Washington June 13.—A drastic food conservation bill, prohibiting the manufacture of malt, spirituous or vinous liquors during the war was agreed to by the Senate Agricultural committee.

The committee voted by a large majority to empower the President to restrict or prohibit the use of perishable food in the manufacture of intoxicants of any kind when the President considers the step necessary. The President is further empowered to commandeer spirits in bond when needed to meet the government requirements for munitions manufacture and for military and hospital supplies.

The bill will be presented to Congress soon, apart from the food production and food control bills. If passed it will prevent the further manufacture of distilled spirits, wine, beer. Because the bill is bound to precipitate a violent fight on the floor of both houses it was decided to make it a separate bill, thus eliminating the danger of blocking the passage of the food control bill.

### U. S. REVENUE CUTTER SUNK IN COLLISION

San Francisco, June 13.—The Pacific Steamship company's steamer "Governor" collided with the United States revenue cutter "McCullough" off Point Arguelle this morning. The McCullough was sunk but the crew was rescued.

A near-panic on the "Governor" followed the collision, the passengers fearing that the "Governor" was also damaged.
