**DOING OUR SHARE**

The Red Cross drive starts on Monday, June 18. The curtain will be rung down on the campaign for the \$100,000 emergency Red Cross fund on June 25. No one will be intentionally overlooked. Business and professional men, farmer and laborer—every body in fact, will be expected to do their bit.

Albany has already been organized and the work of organizing the entire county will be completed by the last of the present week. No precinct will be ignored and every man, woman and child in the county is expected to cooperate in the work of raising the sum apportioned to this section of the state.

If we are to send an army to Europe we must accept the responsibilities which go with warfare. It is not enough to clothe and feed the boys in blue. They must be taken care of when they are wounded and it takes money to purchase medical supplies and maintain physicians and nurses in the field. In this war, as in all other wars, the responsibilities of raising the funds rests with the Red Cross, an organization which knows no flag but the flag of humanity and which must bear the brunt of the work of caring for the sick and wounded who are brought back from the trenches.

Neither Albany nor the other sections of the county are going to turn a deaf ear to an appeal of this character. The money will be raised and it will be raised without any serious difficulty. Linn county has never yet failed to respond to the call of patriotism, and it isn't going to hesitate or fail in the present emergency.

**PHYSICAL EDUCATION  
CAMP AT OAK RIDGE**

The Eugene Branch National Association of Physical Education has just taken out a special use permit for a tract of land near Oak Ridge, Oregon on the Cascade National Forest, to be used as a summer camp for the boys and girls of Eugene and vicinity, according to the announcement of District Forester George H. Cecil of Portland, Oregon.

The plans call for the erection of a log lodge and sleeping tents with permanent floors. An athletic field for various outdoor sports will be constructed. Timber for building purposes and for fuel will be granted free of charge by the Forest Service. Part of the summer the camp will be occupied by groups of girls and at other times by groups of boys, under competent leaders who have had experience in social work.

**Eleanor Henry in Role of Russian Princess**
