NEEDED LEGISLATION

Conspicuous public service is performed by the American Federation of Labor, the great railroad orders, the Federation of Postal Employees and the labor members of Congress in uniting to demand prompt action upon laws to conserve, increase and control the country's resources, says the New York World.

Though war was declared more than two months ago, Congress has not yet enacted the urgently needed legislation governing food and other life necessities. Even the compromise Lever bill, robbed of many good features, is held up by a coalition of malign forces, of which partisanship, however base and petty, is the most respectable.

While Congress thus has shirked what Secretary Houston calls a "political and moral obligation and a military necessity," millions of bushels of wheat have been lost as human food for lack of a new milling standard to save more of the bran. And millions of men have wandered with Representative Nolan why a 35-ounce loaf is sold in France for 8 cents, while a 14-ounce loaf from the same flour sells in Washington for 10 cents.

"Throughout the past three years," says Herbert C. Hoover, "two worlds have been written over the pages of English history, 'Too Late!' Unless the Lever bill is passed immediately, before the grain is harvested, 'Too Late' will be written in our history."

The Lever bill and the Production Bill are not all that we would have asked, or need; much has been sacrificed to placate the dark forces that in the very walls of the Capitol work against the Nation at war. But they are something they will help democracy. Congress will act, because it must act. Shall it be Too Late?
