SAGE ROOSTER BOBS UP IN MARSHFIELD

Grows Poetic Over Ship Building and Scenic Beauties of Trip

Marshfield, Ore., June 14, 1917.
Editor of Democrat:

The writer left Eugene on the 12:05 p. m. train, June 11 for Marshfield to spend a few weeks in the sea breeze for the benefit of his health which has been on the bum for several months.

The trip from Eugene to Marshfield is through a somewhat rough and broken country. After crossing the Siuslaw river at Cushman, the road skirts along the Lakes most of the way to Marshfield. Some of those lakes are very picturesque. The most prominent one on the route is Silcott Lake. This is a beautiful body of water and is fast becoming a summer resort. Several places along its shores have been plotted into lots for summer resorts. The lake is about four miles wide.

The town of West Lake is just across the lake from Lane Station on the railroad.

A steam launch meets all trains at Lane and Ada to carry passengers to West Lake. A very neat and prosperous town. Fishing and hunting are always good on the lake and a great many people come here and camp.

I arrived in Marshfield on June 11, at 6:30 p. m. On the 12th I visited the Smith saw mills and lumbering plant which I believe are the largest on the Oregon coast. It is worth any one's time to go through their plant and watch them load a vessel with their travelling derrick.

From the mills I went to Bunkers Hill where I met two old Albany boys—Will Dindinger and his brother. Will is proprietor of the Bunker Hill general merchandise store. He is doing a fine business.

On my way back I met another old Albany friend, F. E. Allen, who used to run a grocery store in Albany. He is ex-mayor of Marshfield. At present he is a traveling salesman for two San Francisco firms. Also two Portland wholesale houses. I enjoyed my visit with him very much.

June 13, I spent in North Bend looking over the town. But put in most of the day in the ship building yards. There was one new ship completed and loading lumber, and there are now three other large vessels on the ways under construction. And it is worth your while to sit and watch the different parts of construction, and to watch the hundreds of men which are employed in the many different capacities, which are required to build such a massive structure, to battle with the great storms and waves of the deep. It seems I could spend days in a ship yard and not tire of it. Late in the afternoon I returned to Marshfield feeling well paid for my trip.

June 14 was Flag Day and all business houses closed at 1 p. m., and all joined in the big parade. The side walks were crowded with people.

The weather has been ideal since I came in here, clear and warm, through the day and cool at night, and I really enjoy the change from the cold chilly rains of the valley to the clear sunshine and sea breeze.

Will remain here two or three weeks.
