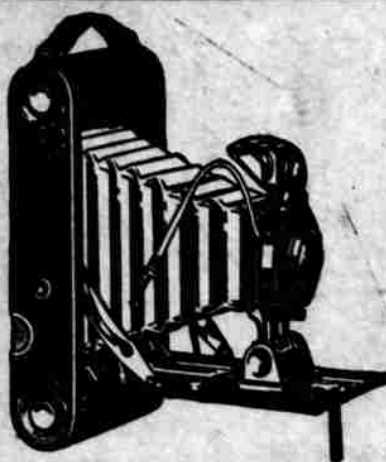

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE SHOWS MEN IN DEMAND

Corvallis, Ore., June 14.—While total registration indicates increased attendance the number of men is below that of last year. The demand for men in national, military, and civil service during the present national crisis is clearly indicated in the registration figures of the Oregon Agricultural College summer session for 1917. These figures show that while slightly increased attendance is indicated the increase is wholly among women students and that there has been a large dropping off in the number of men. The figures for the first three days were, 1916: 243; 1917, 222.
