THE FOOD BILL

The President is right in demanding quick action on the food control bill now pending in congress. Both senators and members of the lower House have been too slow in acting upon the recommendation of the Department of Agriculture and the situation becomes more serious every day action is delayed.
 A vote against the food control bill is a vote for bread riots. Every hour the vote is delayed puts just that many more dollars into the hands of the food gamblers and takes many more away from the pockets of the consuming public. The man who speculates in the necessities of life is an ally of the Kaiser and a traitor to his own country. The member of congress who denies the people legislation tending to curb this evil is playing a questionable game and must answer to his constituents at the expiration of his term of office.
 Complaint is heard in some quarters that the bill would establish in this county the office of food dictator clothed with unlimited powers. Possibly so but the Democrat would much prefer to see an office of this kind filled with a responsible appointee of the constituted government rather than to see it vested in the food gamblers who now control the markets and squeeze every penny from the tax-burdened consumer.
 Whether the United States wins the war against Germany depends largely upon our ability to husband our resources and make every dollar and every acre count. We can't do this if we must fight both the food speculator at home and the Kaiser abroad. The bill proposed by President Wilson proposes to eliminate speculation in the necessities of life and thus enable us to feed ourselves and our allies with the least possible exertion. Congress ought to back up the President and it ought to do it without any further delay.

MARINE OFFICER, RETIRED, RETURNS TO FIGHT FOR FLAG

Washington, June 19.—There's a little spot in Ireland that Michael McNamara had in his "mind's eye" for a long time—thirty years, in fact. All that time Michael was obeying orders, drilling, campaigning, and doing the hundred-and-one things that fall to the lot of the American Marine.
 Michael finished his time, retiring with the rank of "Sargint major, no less," and went back to that little spot in County Mayo.
 Then came our participation in the war. Did Michael stay retired? He did not! He came right back on the S. S. St. Louis, paying his own fare, and went directly to the United States Marine Corps headquarters to volunteer his services.
 McNamara could have signed up his fifty-odd years, he is still a "foine with some Irish regiment for, despite broth av a boy." Instead, he braved the submarines to fight under the flag that for thirty years he had called his own.
