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PORTLAND WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REPORT

North Portland, Or., June 19.—Yesterday's receipts were: 800 cattle; 1000 hogs; 400 sheep.

Cattle

Yesterday's market in beef steers was active, with prices ranging from 25 cents to 55 cents higher, which was the first real upturn the market has had for about a month. Buyers had to step lively to get in at all on the supply, which was sold out in the early morning hours. All killers seem to be in need of immediate supplies. While there were no strictly fat steers in the entire run, with the exception of one head at \$10.50; they are quoting prime hard grass steers from \$10.25 to \$10.50. Four loads of very good California steers brought \$10.00, which sold about 25 cents higher. Several loads of very good yearling steers although not fat, brought \$9.25 to \$9.50, ordinary and medium steers brought the biggest advances for the day, most of which sold 50 cents higher, with one sale fully 55 cents higher. Sales on these grades ranged from \$8.00 to \$9.00. Demand for killers did not seem to want and prices were fully steady with a week ago, and in many cases 25 cents higher, that is, on fat stuff. The best cows sold from \$8.25 to \$8.75; with a few choice heifers

going at \$9.00. Thin dairy bred stuff, of which there was quite a spread yesterday, got only steady bids, prices ranged from \$5.00 to \$7.00. There were only a few thin bulls on the market, with very little demand and steady prices. Best heavy bulls selling from \$7.00 to \$7.25.

Hogs

With the smallest Monday run of hogs in years on the market yesterday it did not seem to have any effect on prices. All the sellers could do was to get a steady bid. Demand continues very light. Several loads of prime hogs brought \$15.25 for the bulk of good hogs. Packers were not willing to give over \$15. Pigs and grass hogs are still being cut very hard with the bulk bringing \$12.00.

Sheep

Prices in the sheep house are from 25 to 75 cents lower than a week ago, although there was a steady market yesterday. Good to choice spring lambs are selling mostly at \$13.50, with culls from \$11.00 to \$12.00. Yearlings, wethers and ewes, especially heavy ones were in for a trimming at the close of the week, from \$10.75 to \$11.00 with wethers from \$10.25 to \$10.50; good to choice shorn ewes brought \$9.00 to \$9.50; with good heavy ewes from \$8.50 to \$9.00. Culls are selling from \$5.00 to \$7.00. Receipts of sheep the past week, while not heavy, were of comparatively good volume, but demand was not very great.

FIGHTING SAMMY POKES A PUNCH

Philadelphia, June 20.—"Fighting Sammy" Katcher, lightweight champion of the United States Marines, won his title in one punch, down in Nicaragua. Now he is busy urging all eligible young men to rally round the banner of the "soldier-sailors," and is using his gifts as an orator to win them over.

Sergeant Katcher won his title when the Marines were on an expedition to the Central American republic, right after a lively affair with revolutionists in which bayonets were used instead of boxing gloves. It took exactly three seconds for Katcher to convince his adversary that there was only one Marine lightweight champion. Since that time no one has disputed the title.

During a recent visit of Jess Willard to this city, Katcher boxed the champion three rounds; the big fellow, who is a friend of Katcher's, consenting to help along the campaign for recruits. In the language of the ring, "Fighting Sammy packs a punch," both as a soldier and recruiter.

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OLD WASHINGTON CERTAIN OF GERMANY'S DEFEAT

Washington, June 18.—(U. P.)—Washington as a war capital is a city of patriotism, enthusiasm and absolute confidence.

It is like a big college town on the eve of an important football game, in which everybody is positive the home team will win.

As yet it has none of the darkened streets and bereaved homes of London and Paris, none of the food regulations and casualty lists of Berlin and Vienna and no hint of the anarchy and riot which have hit Petrograd.

The city is afire with flags, and at night searchlights pick out the Stars and Stripes floating over many of the downtown buildings. The thump of the war drum is frequently heard, the crash of martial music stirs historic Pennsylvania avenue. Soldiers and sailors mingle with the crowds, but they attract little attention. Bagpipes sound, the thrill of life rings over the noise of traffic as the citizens go about their "business as usual."

In the midst of the most important period since Southern armies smashed at the capital's defenses 50 years ago, Washington refuses to believe there is cause for anything more than a feeling of implicit confidence that with every man and woman "in the play" the Kaiser will be soundly thrashed and war's darker side will never throw a shadow over its gay street.

There are guards at the Government buildings, where official passes or permits are demanded. This about sums up the war atmosphere

visible to the casual observer in Washington.

Underneath it all there is the real, grim push of preparation for the titanic conflict, but these activities do not crop out on the surface. The people radiate confidence. Their attitude toward the great army now in process of organization is "Eat 'em up, boys, and get home soon. We'll wait for dinner."
