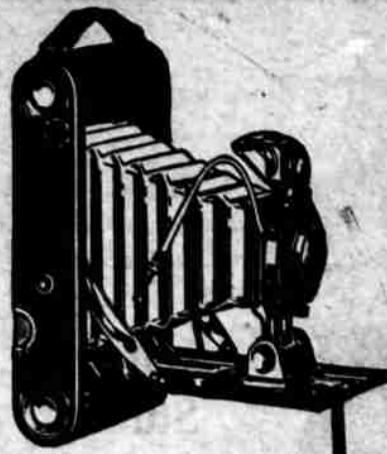

The man in uniform is denied the right to buy booze and the saloons selling to any soldier are subject to heavy fines and penalties. As a consequence we have quite an orderly and sober bunch of men. It really is a good thing as no longer can be seen men of the army or navy reeling down the street to the disgrace of the soberly inclined men of the service. The public does not discriminate and classes all men in uniform alike. So you see we are all classed as a drunken lot on account of the ill-advised acts of men who cannot control their appetites.

The Albany men often get together and talk of things at home. We would enjoy coming back for a few days before going into active service. It may be possible. We are ordered up for another physical examination and possibly the doctors will find physical defects not discovered when we took one other test, that may disqualify for service. It would be a sad blow to anyone here to find that on account of a bad eye, defective hearing or flat foot, or some other reason, they were denied the right to continue in a service we have all looked forward to and held as a life ambition, especially at a time when the nation calls and so urgently needs men, for we all want to do our part. In the final analysis of things a man is only a small factor and it is not so necessary that any of us live when by making the sacrifice we can save for mankind and the world the prized principles of Liberty and Freedom.
