EPISCOPALIAN MISSIONARY
HERE SOLICITING FUNDS

Rev. Golata Joseph, of Turk-ridden Kurdistan, Seeks Funds for Starving

The Reverend Deacon Golata Joseph of Kurdistan, a province south of Armenia, Asia, arrived in the city yesterday in his quest for funds for his starving people. Rev. Joseph brings credentials from Episcopal bishops and high officials in the church and relates a story of terrible torture of the people of that part of the world by the terrible Turks at the outbreak of the war.

With the beginning of hostilities in 1914, the Turks swarmed to Armenia, Kurdistan and other provinces, slaughtering the people, destroying their churches, houses and other property, carrying off their cattle, horses, hogs and sheep, taking their grain and other food and laying waste to the whole country of the innocent people.

In Kurdistan over half the people were killed, men tortured, women and children tortured and inhumanly mistreated. Those able to get away fled to the mountains and are living today in caves on what food they can secure by primitive methods. Rev. Joseph and 20 of his followers fled to Persia and are now making their home at Ayan, Salamas.

Many people are giving small amounts to relieve the suffering and starving people and many lives are being saved through the donations collected. Rev. Joseph is a native of his country, well educated and speaks very good English.

Had the pleasure of a short street talk with Mrs. E. R. Thompson, on Washington street. Mr. and Mrs. Thompson were both former Albany people, in 1890, members of an Albany Club called the Social Sevens, composed of seven boys and seven girls, now scattered over the country, some dead.

The namesake of one of them, Gif. Freeman, named for Gif Foster, recently enlisted in the navy at St. Paul, and also a cousin, a son of Bob Foster. Mr. Freeman, though nearly sixty, has offered his services in the engineer's reserve corps.
