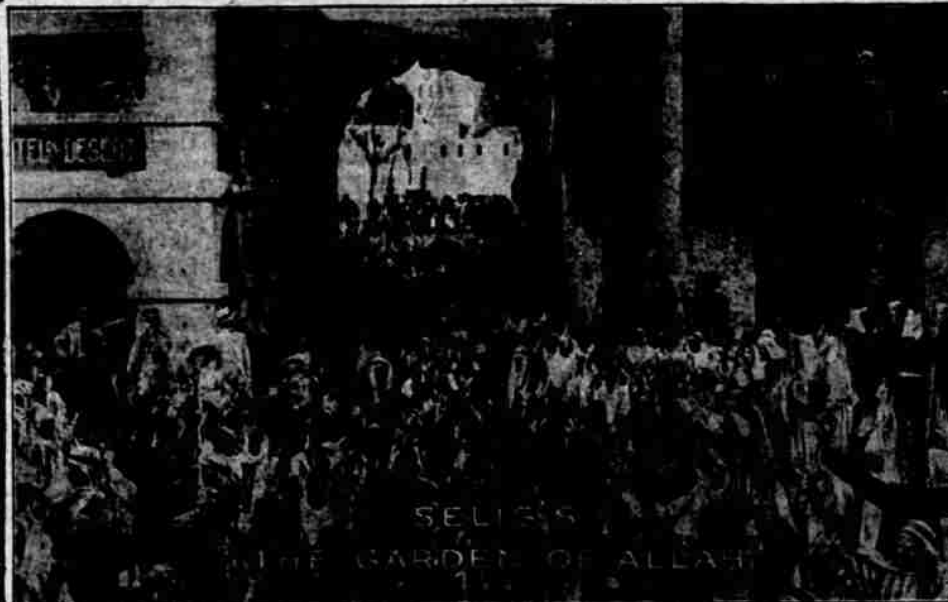

ALBANY COLLEGE AT SEABECK

Albany College will be represented at the Northwestern Conference of the Young Women's Christian Association at Seabeck, Washington, this year by Miss Helen Lee, Miss Eloise Leighton, and Miss Nelson McDonald. These three young ladies are particularly active in the Y. W. C. A. at the College, and are being sent by the Y. W. C. A. to represent the College at Seabeck, and to bring back to the College next year the inspiration and information which will be the very atmosphere of this great conference. This gathering occurs annually at Seabeck, a place on Hood Canal in Kitsap county, Washington, about this time of year. The dates this year are June 23 to July 3. This is a conference both of city and student Young Women's Christian Associations of Washington, Oregon, Idaho, and Montana. Its purpose is to renew the spiritual life of the delegates and to study plans and methods of Association work that may be adapted to the representative localities represented.

The morning of each day is spent in Bible study, classes on modern problems, association technique and kindred subjects. The afternoons are left entirely free for rest and recreation. The recreation is thoroughly planned and studied by experts in athletics and involves hikes, boating, and games of all sorts. The evenings are mostly taken up with addresses by men and women of national reputation. These men and women come from the four quarters of the country, and bring inspiration, encouragement and information to their work drawn from lives of rich experience. Albany College is fortunate in having a share in such wonderful things.
