SAGE ROOSTER SCOUTING
AROUND IN COOS COUNTY

Bandon, Oregon

Editor Democrat:

I left Marshfield at 8 o'clock the
26th for Bandon by way of Coquille.
I transferred to boat which left Co-
quille at 9 o'clock, arriving in Bandon
at 11:30 a. m. The afternoon I spent
on the beach. This is a beautiful
beach and at low tide can be travel-
led more than 3 miles between the
breakers and bluffs. There is also a
fine highway built of crushed stone,
for several miles along the top of the
bluff for auto travel.

The writer has been looking over
Bandon today and noting the many
changes that have taken place since
he first saw Bandon in 1877. When
the writer landed in Bandon in 1877
there was a ferry boat and a little
store run by a Mr. Lewis, no post of-
fice. The writer worked in Captain
Parker's logging camp at that time
with about 35 other loggers. We cut
nothing but white cedar during the 3
months I was in the camp. At present
a large high school building, some
business houses, and a large part of
the resident portion of Bandon and a
nice cemetery covers the ground we
logged off, and there is today a town
of 3000, and a large woolen mill, can-
nery, saw mills, box factories, plan-
ers and almost every line of business
and professions are represented here
now.

Three large steamers from San
Francisco, the Acme, Elizabeth and
Bandon, crossed in over the bar at
11 o'clock, only a few hundred yards
apart. Main street of Bandon faces
the bar and you can sit down at the
end of the street and watch the ships
cross in and out over the bar and
watch the swells of the old Pacific
roll in and break upon the rocks and
shore. The weather is fine, a little
showery last night, but clear and
warmer today. Today, Friday, I took
a 21-2 hike bike over the ground we
logged off in 1877, and find good auto
roads and well kept streets, where
there were only deer and elk trails
among the trees and stumps in 1877.
I have just come back from the
wharf where the steamer Elizabeth
has just completed loading a large
cargo of lumber and is now taking on
80 tons of cheese from the cheese fac-
tory here, which will complete her
cargo and she will leave on the one
o'clock tide for San Francisco.
