WIND SATURDAY EVENING DOES SMALL DAMAGE

Albany and vicinity was visited with a small sized cyclone Saturday evening and for a time it was thought that serious damage to the fruit crop was going to be done. W. A. Bodine reports that there were many trees broken throughout the county and unless the trees whose large limbs were torn from the trunks were carried for properly at once they would die.

The wind whipped and lashed the branches of the trees and many tender and brittle branches were broken off. The general report seems to indicate that the damage done was not serious, although there will be a great deal of fruit wasted.

F. M. Mitchell brought in a small prune branch with 53 prunes on it which seems to refute any statement that Linn would have a poor prune crop. The prunes were in fair condition and Mr. Mitchell states that this is general throughout his orchard. He states that the wind damaged his cherries more than anything else by breaking off a few and bruising others by blowing them against each other.
