

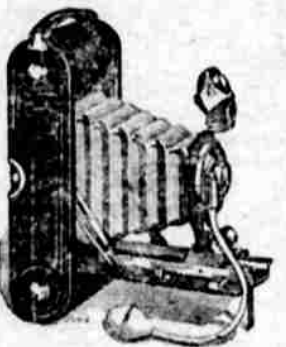

ASSOCIATE OF HERBERT HOOVER TO SPEAK

Former Dean of Home Economics Returns for Lecture Monday

Oregon Agricultural College, June 28.—(Special)—Albany O. A. C. students, alumni and women who have taken work with Ms. Henrietta W. Calvin while she was dean of Home Economics, will have an opportunity to hear her again in a couple of her masterful addresses which she will deliver at the campus next Monday and Tuesday evenings at 7:30. She has been associated with Herbert Hoover, known the world over for his food administration work in Belgium and America, and has a distinct message on present food emergency and how to meet it. She is the Home Economic specialist of the United States Bureau of Education and is familiar with the food situation in Oregon and in the country at large.

Mrs. Max West of the United States Children's Bureau, is expected to arrive the latter part of this week and may be still on the campus on the date of Dean Calvin's lectures. Both of these specialists will speak before the National Educational Association, which meets in Portland July 7 to 14.

OAKVILLE HAS RED CROSS MEETING NEXT SUNDAY

Oakville had a Red Cross meeting on the evening of Sunday, June 24, at the United Presbyterian church.

Several men who have led the Red Cross campaign at Tangent so successfully through the week, came to Oakville by automobile where a well-attended and enthusiastic meeting was held after the regular people's service.

Among the speakers were Mr. Speer, mayor of Tangent, with Messrs. Blevis, Jinks, Luper, and Gillet. After discussion of the Red Cross financial drive, the matter was presented and many contributions made as well as a committee appointed to canvass the precinct.

The Orleans precinct had been left out of the original early plan for division of the county, but the precinct with contributions of more than \$200 given before any presenting of the matter was done, promises to measure up well with its portion.

MARKET NEWS

North Portland, June 26, 1917.—Receipts yesterday were 1500 cattle; 50 calves; 1400 hogs; 800 sheep.

Cattle

A big supply of cattle was received from California and Central Oregon points, although only a few lots in the entire run were strictly fat stuff. There was an excellent demand from practically all Northwest butchers and killers and the large run was quickly absorbed at prices ranging from steady to 25c higher. One lot of which was the only real prime lot of steers in the entire run and buyers showed that they were willing to pay for well finished beef. Several other small bunches brought \$10.25 and \$10.50, with one load of very good steers at \$10.00. The supply of fair to good steers did not meet the demand although the common and ordinary stuff was again very slow in moving although steady prices ruled generally. The bulk of the fair grade steers brought from \$9.00 to \$9.75, with ordinary and medium steers from \$8.00 to \$8.50; and thin Jersey steers around \$6.00.

Strictly choice cows and heifers were in good demand with several lots around \$8.00, with strictly fat dairy bred cows and probably a little lower on a few sales, selling from \$5 to \$6.50. Bulls were in good supply and demand equally as good, with heavy bulls again bringing \$7.50. A lot of fairly good bulls that weighed 1150 pounds, sold at \$6.65. Calves were unchanged, with but little demand best light vealers bringing \$9.50. There were several loads of good feeding steers on the market which sold readily at steady prices. Good quality feeders brought from \$7 to \$8.25.

Hogs

There was a very brisk trade in the hog alleys yesterday. The demand was excellent, with comparatively good supply and prices advanced from the start, with a net gain for the day of from 25 to 35 cents. Several of the best lots brought \$15.60, with the bulk of the sales running from \$15.35 to \$15.50. Pigs are still being cut very hard by buyers, with the bulk at \$12 to \$12.50, although small bunches are being taken up to \$13.50. The drop in the hog market, which amounted to about a dollar a hundred weight during the last three weeks seems to be checked and very few hogs are in sight.

Sheep

Receipts of sheep continue light with very little demand and prices are generally weakening. Best spring lambs are bringing from \$12.75 to \$13.00. Cull lambs are suffering a severe cut and packers are bidding around \$6.00. One bunch of prime shorn yearlings brought \$10.75 from an outside buyer, although the bulk of the good to choice yearlings are selling from \$9.50 to \$10.00. Heavy ewes do not seem to be wanted by practically any of the killers and \$8 seems to be about the best prices that any of the Willamette valley ewes are bringing, although a few sales are being made around \$8.50.
