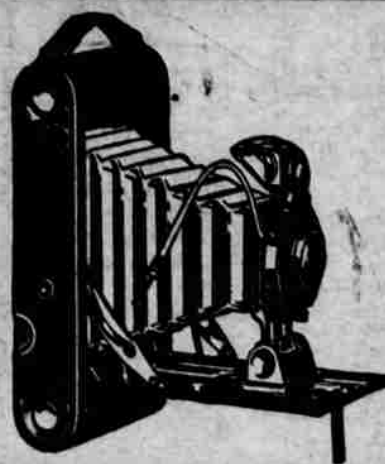

LODGE DECLARES WAR ON DRY AMENDMENT

Would Permit Manufacture of
Beer and Wine; Opposes
Radical Liquor Legislation

Washington, June 28.—Senator Lodge, member of the finance committee, this afternoon opened the attack on the dry amendment the Senate agricultural committee adopted to the food control bill.

He urged legislation preventing further manufacture of distilled spirits, and authorizing the commandeering of all spirits in bond instead of the bonded duty clause.

Lodge proposed to permit the further manufacture of beers and wines.

ORGANIZE AUSTRIAN MINERS AGAINST CONSCRIPTION

Trinidad, Colo., June 28.—County authorities are investigating the report that a German spy is organizing Austrians and other proGerman miners to resist conscription. Many Austrians are employed in the local coal fields and the undercurrent against the draft is strong.
